

ONE-WAY CLOSURE OF THE ZIG-ZAG

As many of you will know the National Trust decided to make the Zig-Zag one-way allowing traffic uphill only over the Easter period. Many of you will have witnessed chaotic parking during high-days and holidays over recent years, resulting in difficulties and delays through the Zig Zag valley. In an effort to combat, the above the system was implemented. Whilst they appreciated this may have been an annoyance to some residents on Box Hill, they hoped it would reduce the likelihood of tailbacks caused by two-way traffic trying to squeeze past parked cars. The one-way system was for all traffic, including cyclists, with the exception of Emergency Services. Road Closed and Car Park Full signs were placed on the Triangle and at the shops. Some motorist ignored the signs and National Trust staff stopped cars before the view point where there was a space to turn around safely.

We will be receiving an update from the National Trust on how the system worked which we will share with everyone. They will be considering taking a similar approach during the May bank holiday weekends, subject to reviewing Easter and the weather forecasts. ACTION FRAUD

Action Fraud is warning people of a new trend that has hit the UK where fraudsters contact victims claiming to be from HM Revenue & Customs (HMRC) and trick them into paying bogus debts and taxes using iTunes gift cards. Victims are being contacted in a variety of methods by fraudsters claiming to be from HMRC and are told they owe an outstanding debt. In the hundreds of cases reported to Action Fraud in the past month, the fraudsters all ask for payment in iTunes gift card voucher codes. Fraudsters are now moving onto iTunes gift cards to collect money from victims because they can be easily redeemed and easily sold on. The scammers don't need the physical card to redeem the value and instead get victims to read out the serial code on the back over the phone.

Fraudsters are contacting victims using Voicemails, Spoofed Calls and Text Messages, and each method attempts to convince the would-be victim that they owe unpaid tax to HMRC. Villager Anne Vine received a similar scam attempt by email (24 April).

How to protect yourself:

HMRC will never use texts to tell you about a tax rebate or penalty or ever ask for payment in this way.

- Telephone numbers and text messages can easily be spoofed. You should never trust the number you see on your telephones display.
- If you receive a suspicious cold call, end it immediately.

Boiler grants

We now have grants of up to £2,500 per household available to replace old or broken boilers for private homeowners / tenants in Surrey, subject to eligibility.

To qualify, a household must meet the following criteria:

The property has a low energy efficiency rating as assessed by Action Surrey AND the household fits one or more of the following categories:

- The total household income is below our set threshold,
- At least one household member is over 75 years old,
- At least one household member has a long term cold related illness or health condition that has been diagnosed by a health professional.

If you or anyone you know may qualify then call Action Surrey on 0800 783 2503 or email info@actionsurrey.org to find out more. Please be aware that evidence may be required for any of the above when applying.

5th May 2017 Last day to spend your paper £5 notes





The old paper £5 note is being withdrawn from circulation on 5th May 2017. The only £5 note that will be legal tender after this date is the polymer £5 note featuring Sir Winston Churchill, which was first introduced in September 2016.

You can continue spending the paper £5 note, which features a portrait of Elizabeth Fry (pictured left), until 5th May.

What happens if I still have a paper £5 note after the withdrawal date?

All Bank of England notes

retain their face value for all time. Some retailers, banks and building societies may still accept these notes, however this is at their own discretion. The Bank of England will always exchange its old-series notes. Notes may be presented for payment either in person or sent by post (at the sender's risk) to: Dept NEX, Bank of England, Threadneedle Street, London EC2R 8AH.

Will I need to provide identification to exchange paper £5 notes?

To comply with anti-money laundering regulations, if you are exchanging large values you may be required to provide identification (such as a passport, drivers licence, national identity card etc.) when exchanging your notes. You should check exact requirements with individual institutions. Please refer to the Bank of England website for further information on exchanging notes with the Bank. http://www.bankofengland.co.uk/banknotes/Pages/default.aspx

How many old fivers are still in circulation?

The Bank of England said more than 50 per cent of "Fry fivers" have already been returned to be destroyed, leaving around 160 million in circulation.

Highways

Surrey County Council have confirmed that the worsening potholes in the centre of Boxhill Road between the Water Works entrance and Fraser Heath House entrance have

been marked with orange paint and will soon also be repaired. However, the dip in Boxhill Road just beyond the last house after The Tree travelling eastwards is being monitored but is not yet considered in need of urgent repair.

Following my request, the drains along Boxhill Road, particularly at the junctions with Fort Road and the track to Chestnut Lodge Farm, are due to be cleared during the Spring so hopefully this will happen any time now.

Dangerous Junction at top of Pebble Hill

Some Box Hill and Headley residents, including myself, have either witnessed or been involved in accidents and/or near misses when turning into or out of either side of the Triangle of the two junctions of Headley Common Road with Dorking Road and Pebble Hill. The problem is the poor sightlines for vehicles exiting Headley Common Road to go in either direction. Due to the angles of exit those turning left into Dorking Road cannot see vehicles (including HGV's coming towards them from Pebble Hill) and those turning right towards Pebble Hill cannot see vehicles coming towards them from Dorking Road.

Many of these dangerous events are not reported to the Police because the accident has not resulted in personal injury, thus it is not ranked as high-risk by the Police or SCC Highways. However, with the increasing traffic flow in both directions, it is only a matter of time before fatalities occur more frequently.

Several people have suggested that the Triangle be replaced by a round-about but I am not sure if this would be any safer. Following normal rules of a round-about the traffic coming up from Pebble Hill would have to give way to vehicles turning right from Dorking Road into Headley Common Road. This would result in HGV's having to dangerously stop at the peak of the steep incline of Pebble Hill which the drivers will be reluctant to do.

Personally, although I am not a road traffic engineer or road safety officer but having driven a large horse box as well as my car in both directions, I would prefer that the split offset junctions either side of the triangle were abolished and a straight wider possibly two-lane (in each direction) junction be constructed as far away as possible from the top of Pebble Hill. This would give improved visibility for both outgoing and incoming vehicles.

Getting past parked commercial vehicles opposite 'Roof of the World' between Headley Heath Approach and Woodlands Park has recently been made even more difficult by vehicles parking on the opposite side of the road in front of Hillcrest. In addition, vehicles have been parking on the bend outside Upper Farm; these were first thought to be customers of the Smith & Western but in fact are visitors to the National Trust whose car parks are full.

Unless the parked cars are causing a total obstruction of the road there is little the Police can do and have suggested that SCC Highways put down Double Yellow Lines. When this was previously suggested the majority of residents were opposed to this proposal.

Milk Chocolate Cake

From Betty Buck of Box Hill

Avid listener Betty who is hooked on the radio station, is a secret choc-o-holic. Just try this cake and you will be too!

Ingredients

For the Cake Mix

7oz Self Raising Flour

8oz Caster Sugar

1/2 tsp Salt (optional)

2 tbs Cocoa

4oz Margarine

2 Eggs, beaten

5 tbs Evaporated Milk

5 tbs Water

1 tsp Vanilla Essence

For the Milk Chocolate Icing 2½oz Margarine

4 tbs Cocoa

8oz Icing Sugar

3 tbs hot scalded Milk

1 tsp Vanilla Essence

Method

Sift together the flour, caster sugar, salt and cocoa powder, then rub in the margarine. Stir in the beaten eggs, evaporated milk, water and vanilla essence. Beat well.

Divide the contents between two 7" greased and floured tins. (Not loose bottomed). Bake in a moderate oven at 170°C/325°F or Gas 3 for 35mins. Turn out and cool.

Melt together the margarine and cocoa, and stir in the other ingredients. Beat until thick. Put a layer of icing between the cakes, then ice the top and sides. **DELICIOUS.**

I have been a regular listener to BBC Southern Counties Radio, now called BBC Surrey/Sussex. I often spoke on the radio on certain subjects. On one occasion, Joanne Good, one of the presenters, asked if anyone lived in a mobile home as she was always fascinated by them. 


DOG GROOMING DAYS

Tick Risk

Last year there was a report regarding canine fatalities in Essex, due to a tick-borne disease normally seen in other

countries. These dogs had never been abroad, where this particular type of tick is known to be, so how did it get here. Also, tick treatment for returning dogs into this country was deemed not necessary, it questions is this the right thing do have done. Ticks can hide themselves very well in not just long haired dog coats, but short haired as well. They could have been picked up on human clothing or accidentally ended up in the luggage and transported over and not been noticed, where at some point the tick/s would have scuttled off somewhere only to await a suitable host to feed from. So, what can pet owners do?



The typical tick season in this country is between spring and autumn, but with the mild winters, ticks can now be seen all the year round. It is not unusual for us at the Parlour to see ticks on dogs in January and February. Therefore, it is recommended that pet owners use a good tick prevention, preferably from a vet and not a cheap one from a supermarket, which we have found

from what customers have told us, that the cheaper ones do not really work very well.

On the whole, ticks common to this country can be harmless. However, this does not mean they are to be ignored. They can irritate your dog; some dogs may have an allergic reaction to them and in severe cases can cause anaemia and even Lyme disease. The ticks that come in from abroad can be fatal. We have already seen a number of dogs coming into the parlour with ticks. On one dog, the tick had caused a very large swelling.

The best tick removing tool is the tick removing hooks. We sell them, as do some good pet shops and vets. I think these are a must for any pet owner. Remember tick prevention treatments does not stop your dog getting ticks, but it does kill the ticks.

Please keep up to date with tick treatments.

Summer exhibition: "Time Gentlemen Please! The story of Dorking pubs", opens on 25th May and plots the growth in the number of pubs from the earliest records in the 13th century to its peak in the 19th century and subsequent decline as the industry met hard times.

At the end of the 19th century, there were 46 licensed premises in Dorking, their growth impacted by the effect of the coaching routes, the market and the arrival of the railway. Later numbers reduced with the temperance movement in the early 20th century and the impact of the licensing laws introduced during the WW1.

The exhibition shows which were the most important and what roles they played in the everyday lives of residents and travellers. Maps plot the locations of the known licensed public houses and beerhouses, some with old photographs, paintings and drawings of how they looked in their heyday. Modern photographs show how they look now or the buildings that have replaced them.

Other pub memorabilia will be on display and there will be a new 120-page book about Dorking pubs available at the Museum. Families are welcome too – there will be a pub sign drawing

competition for children and a chance to try their hand at some old pub games.




New Scam


Report of Meeting: 13th April

She went along with her mother's idea and said that it for her because she was so shy she just was not able to



Rhoda and her dedicated group of volunteers were also involved with the making of the commemorative quilts presented to every team attending the 2012 London Olympics


In 2012 Rhoda and her team were commissioned by Runnymede Borough Council to create an embroidery panel to mark the 800th anniversary of the signing of the Magna Carter, to be exhibited throughout the UK. The one panel became seven poster sized panels depicting Runnymede, Canterbury, Bury St. Edmunds, the City of London, St Albans, Hereford - the Magna Carter towns - and the Magna Carter Barons Crests. Every kind of embroidery stitch was used, including machine embroidery and one lady, trying to depict the Chained Library at Canterbury raided her jewellery box and used her own silver chain necklaces. Included in the commission were also a further five panels depicting Britain and the Commonwealth. The finished results are amazingly beautiful and will eventually be housed at a specially built location at Royal Holloway.

WHAT'S IN A NAME? by Bill Donnelly

In April's issue, I wrote about that other "village" of Box Hill, now a suburb of the greater Melbourne metropolis in the State of Victoria, in Australia.

The State was named after Queen Victoria. Governor General Bourke who was based in Sydney, petitioned the UK Government to set up a new State to be named after her Imperial Majesty.

The coast's main marine outlet at that time was called Port Philip, which the Governor General visited in 1837 to confirm a nearby site for a new city to become the capital of the new State of Victoria. The story goes that a leading settler was keen for this new city to be named after himself – while others preferred the name of the then British Prime Minister.



The story goes that, as is fashionable today, a referendum was to be held on the naming issue. On the one hand, the name was proposed of William Lamb, 2nd Viscount Melbourne of Melbourne in Derbyshire – Lord Melbourne PM (*left*)

On the other hand, the name was put forward of a settler who was well known as a grazier, entrepreneur and local explorer of the hinterland of the coast in Van Dieman's land (now named Tasmania). His dealings with the local Aboriginal peoples were controversial — local artist, John Glover, called him "a rogue, thief, cheat and liar, a

murderer of blacks (*sic*), and the vilest man I have ever known". His treaty for Aboriginal land in 1835 is still hotly debated today.



This settlers name was John Batman (*left*). When he found the current site of central Melbourne, he noted in his diary of 8th June 1835, "This will be the place for a village" and declared the land 'Batmania'. Maybe if he had won the alleged referendum, the capital of the State of Victoria would have been called 'Batmanville'!

Let's hope that the newly elected US President doesn't hear about the story, and equally set up a referendum to change the name of Washington DC – to 'Trumpton'!

The concert scene starts to become a little quieter in May as we move towards the summer months. However, there is still some fine orchestral and chamber music to be enjoyed. The Royal Philharmonic Orchestra will be visiting Dorking to play a concert at the Dorking Halls, with a programme centred on Beethoven's great fifth symphony. There will also be music by Mozart, and the distinguished cellist Raphael Wallfisch will join the orchestra for Tchaikovsky's delightful *Variations on a Rococo* theme. This is an excellent chance to hear a world-class orchestra and soloist without the trouble and expense of travelling to London.

The Dorking Chamber Orchestra's concert will feature the leader, Clare Kennington, playing Beethoven's violin concerto. Their programme also includes Haydn and Rossini, along with the winning composition from the orchestra's own Young Composer scheme.

Also, the **Surrey Philharmonic Orchestra**, which sadly we rarely hear in Dorking now, will be playing in Ashtead. Their programme includes Dvořák's very popular *New World Symphony* and Weber's overture to his opera *Der Freischütz*, along with a rarity - the violin concerto by the English composer Gordon Jacob.

The **Sitkovetsky Piano Trio** will be making two appearances locally. First, they perform at Denbies as part of the Investec International Music Festival, when they will play music by Schubert, Fauré and Ravel. They will also play in a concert arranged by the Dorking Concertgoers, at the Yehudi Menuhin School, where they will play works by Haydn, Dvořák and Saint-Saëns. The Dvořák piece is his *Dumky trio* - a popular and tuneful work based on Ukrainian folk dances. Please note this concert is in the afternoon!

Fiona Harrison is a local classical guitarist who last year played for the Concertgoers in a sell-out concert at the Dorking Halls. Anyone who attended that concert (or was unable to get a ticket!) now has a second chance to hear her when she plays at St Mary Magdalene church in South Holmwood.

The lunchtime concert at St Martin's will be by Richard Buck and the Buck Brass.



Exhibition: 28th April until the end of Season

A collection of Wedgwood ceramics will be on display at Leith Hill Place this year, returning to the house for the first time in over 50 years.



Assembled by Ralph Wedgwood, cousin to the well-known composer Ralph Vaughan Williams, the collection contains over 140 pieces of Wedgwood ceramic ranging from tea sets to vases, beads and even a pair of earrings. Whilst most people associate Wedgwood china with the distinctive blue colour of the jasper ware, a kind of stoneware invented by Josiah Wedgwood in 1771 after countless experiments, the diversity of wares has always been a significant feature of the production. Jasper itself comes in a variety of colours as can be seen in the exhibition along with black basalt, creamware and even 'first period' bone china.


Not all items from the Wedgwood collection will be on display at Leith Hill Place. Some of the more significant items are already on loan to other museums such as the British Museum, Victoria & Albert Museum in London and the Ashmolean Museum in Oxford, including plates from the 'Frog' service created for Empress Catherine the Great of Russia and a First Day's Vase, one of only seven thrown on the very first day in June 1759 when the Wedgwood factory moved to Etruria in Staffordshire.

Natalie Savage, Visitor Operations Manager for the National Trust at Leith Hill Place said, "Putting this exhibition together has been a real team effort. Many of the volunteers at the house have been involved in researching, designing, interpreting and displaying the ceramics. Working within the confines of the Grade II* listed building has often been a challenge, but it's a real sense of achievement to display this historic collection in its original setting."

Vaughan Williams inherited Leith Hill Place in 1944 and a year later passed it to the National Trust, for the benefit of the nation. The house was then let to Ralph Wedgwood, who made it his family home and proudly displayed his collection of Wedgwood ceramics, which in the 1950s was open for the public to view two




afternoons a week. Ralph assembled his collection from family inheritances, auctions and one-off purchases. Subsequent generations have added their own items to the collection, showing the timelessness the of ceramics and the range of the factory.

Natalie continued, "One of the more exciting finds when researching for the

exhibition was an inventory from 1955 of the items at Leith Hill Place, which listed not only a description of each item, but also its location in the house. Where possible we've tried to restore items to their original position."

The exhibition is being held in memory of the late Sir Martin Wedgwood and will run from 28 April to 29 October Friday-Sunday and Bank Holiday Mondays from 11am-5pm. Entrance to the exhibition is free, but admission charges for Leith Hill Place will apply. National Trust members receive free entry. A series of special events will be held throughout the year and will be advertised on the National Trust website: www.nationaltrust.org.uk/leith-hill-place

This is my Father's glory, that you bear much fruit, showing yourselves to be my disciples. John 15.8

Isabelle's Story

Isabelle's house. Isabelle's front room. Isabelle's cups and plates and cakes. The home group is meeting. They are thinking about where their individual frontlines may be. How they can serve God in their everyday life with people who don't know Jesus. They have been going around the room and it's Isabelle's turn. She pauses, 'Well I don't think I can do anything. I mean I am retired. I look after my husband, I look after the house. I do a few things at church, I see my grandchildren No I don't really think I have a front line.'

She is out of sync with the rest of the group. Like turning up at a party dressed as a pink flamingo only to find is a civic reception for the Ambassador for Saudi Arabia!

There is a pause. Someone says, 'So tell us about your grandchildren'.

Isabelle begins and then says '...and the eldest come around for Sunday lunch three or four times a month. She asks about church and the sermon and so on.'

There is another pause. And someone asks, 'How old is your grandchild?'.

No-one knew it at that moment, but Isabelle's world was about to change. 'She's twenty-three.'

The door to a new way of thinking swings wide on its hinges. Pretty much every Sunday Isabelle is having a significant conversation about church life and biblical teaching with someone who is not a Christian and who is twenty-three ... right slap bang in the middle of the age group that the church in the UK is finding it hardest to reach. And they didn't know.

The group decide they had better start praying for Isabelle.

And Isabelle realises she has a front line and she hadn't seen it. As she put it 'I didn't realise God wanted to work in my family'. None of her family had seen it either. 
