ACTION FRAUD

If you haven't already signed up you might want to. You can sign up for free to *Action Fraud Alert* to receive direct, verified, accurate information about scams and fraud in your area by email, recorded voice and text message. The system is provided by the National Fraud Intelligence Bureau (NFIB) which is run by the City of London Police as a national service.

The system uses the Neighbourhood Alert Platform which is a secure, national community messaging facility used by Police, Neighbourhood and Home Watch, Crimestoppers, Fire & Rescue Services and local authorities throughout the UK. Just search online for Action Fraud – how to sign up for alerts.

Dog Theft

Dog theft is on the rise, and as such, Neighbourhood Watch and Dogs Trust are urging the public to be vigilant and report any suspicious activity. In 2016 alone, nearly 1,800 instances of dog theft were reported to police forces across England and Wales.

ACTION FRAUD – Dog Theft (Continuation)

Information request also reveals that gardens, closely followed by the home, are the most common areas from which dogs were reported stolen. Lee Paris, Campaigns Officer at Dogs Trust, told Neighbourhood Watch "It is a sad day when we have to issue these types of warnings, but with instances of dog theft becoming more prevalent, we want to ensure that dog owners are aware of the dangers so that they can help keep their beloved pets safe. Theft of any item is distressing, but when a dog is stolen, who many consider a part of the family; the experience can be even more distressing."

The most common breed of dog reported as stolen was the Staffordshire Bull-terrier, followed then by the Jack Russell Chihuahua and the Bulldog. The *Dogs Trust* warns that any dog, whatever the breed, is at risk of theft if left unsupervised. By making small changes to the garden and the home, and by registering to a local Neighbourhood Watch scheme, we hope we can help reduce the number of dog theft instances. The message they want to get across when it comes to garden security is that they want to keep the dog in, but keep thieves out!

As such, Dogs Trust advises never to leaving your dog unattended, and has put together the following advice on how to help protect your dog from the risk of theft and what to do should the worst happen. Whether you own a dog or not, intruders should not be able to access your garden or property.

- Keep garden fences secure to avoid your dog escaping and to prevent easy access to trespassers. Perhaps install a sensor light or bell gate to be alerted of trespassers?
- Always keep your dog in sight on walks and in your garden. When out walking your dog, make sure your dog is trained to respond to a recall command.
- 3. Never leave a dog tied-up outside a shop or left alone in a car. If you're going in to a shop or to a café, for example, why not check if your dog is allowed inside? You may be surprised!
- 4. Ensure your dog is microchipped, has up-to-date contact details, and is wearing a tag with YOUR name, phone number and address on it. All of these are legal requirements and will ensure your dog is easily returned, should they go missing.

Dog Theft (Continuation)

- 5. Have your dog spayed/neutered. Not only does this mean your pet will be less likely to stray, it may also prevent theft for breeding purposes.
- 6. If you plan to use services such as a dog walker, groomers, house sitter or a boarding kennel, do your research to ensure you are using a legitimate and reputable service.
- 7. Do not advertise the fact you own dogs. Avoid placing dog ownership placards or notices on the front of your property.
- 8. If you are a dog breeder, be careful about who you are inviting into your house for viewings

ACTION FRAUD

Holidaymakers urged to watch new counter terrorism safety video

Whilst the chances of being involved in a terror attack abroad remain low, holidaymakers travelling abroad are being urged to watch the video designed to help keep them safe in the event of an incident.

The key advice is:

- Run to a place of safety. This is better than trying to surrender or negotiate.
- Hide it is better to hide than confront.
- Barricade yourself in, turn your phone to silent and use only when it is safe to do so.
- Tell Make sure you know the local emergency numbers in the country you're travelling to. For all EU countries, the number to call is 112.

COMMUNITY RECYCLING CENTRES

Surrey County Council (SCC) changes to Community Recycling Centres (CRC's) due to take place in 2018/19

Your MVDC Councillors have strongly objected to the

proposed changes that include the possible permanent closure of smaller CRC's such as Ranmore Road, Dorking; ceasing the 7 days a week operations and restrictions on what can be dropped off at no cost at the larger CRC's such as Randalls Road, Leatherhead. Financially it seems that SCC has no choice other than to make some cuts due to the reduction in Government subsidies to County Councils and SCC's legal inability to increase Council Tax beyond the 2% set by Central Government. You may recall that SCC had publicly stated it wanted to increase its Council Tax by 15% to cover the reduction in the Government subsidy.

The CRC's (e.g. Ranmore Road, Dorking) that SCC are planning to closedown are small with restricted handling facilities and uneconomic to operate compared to the larger Randalls Road Leatherhead site that also has the separate commercial Waste Transfer Station. I know that some of Box Hill and Headley residents prefer to use the small and friendly Ranmore Road, Dorking CRC because the larger CRC at Randalls Road Leatherhead does sometimes have long waiting times caused by the large refuse carts having to que, sometimes for an hour or more, to get into the Waste Transfer Station that shares the same access road.

Despite what is frequently inferred in the Dorking & Leatherhead Advertisers fly tipping, which must be cleared by the local authorities (e.g. MVDC), has not significantly increased in Mole Valley, in fact there was a small reduction around autumn 2016. In some cases, with help of Police forensics, the owners of some fly tipped rubbish have been identified and fined. Incidentally, the refuse recycling centres are run by SCC but the refuse collection is run by local authorities (including MVDC) and subcontracted to contractors. Hopefully, the Conservative Councillors of both MVDC and SCC can work out a satisfactory solution to resolve this problem.

This, I am sorry to say, may be the beginning of financial reviews and possible cuts in SCC services for 2018/19. To minimise cuts to essential services there could be reductions in the frequency of such things as grass cutting, pavement weed control, hedge trimming etc. This is largely due to the huge National Debt repayments plus interest, inherited from the Blair Labour government plus further borrowings to plug the gap (loss) between what we earn and what we spend as a nation continues.

MOLE VALLEY CONSULTATION

'Future Mole Valley' involves an important review of Local Planning including Commercial Activity and Housing Needs. If we do not decide for ourselves on the future of Mole Valley and the very special area in which we are fortunate to live then the government of whichever political group is in power after the next general election will decide for us.

Hopefully, you have responded to the Future Mole Valley Consultation prior to its 1st September closure. If not, you may be able to promptly submit your written responses to MVDC requesting late inclusion.

HEADLEY COURT – The uncertain future

The only certainties are that:

- Towards the end of 2018 the MoD Defence Medical Rehabilitation Centre (DMRC) will be closing as, by the Autumn of 2018, it is planning to move from Headley Court to the new very much larger purpose-built Defence National Rehabilitation Centre (DNRC) set in the huge 300+ acre grounds of Stanford Hall in Nottinghamshire and
- 2. The Charitable Trust that owns Headley Court must sell it for the best price it can achieve, to continue its charitable objective which is the rehabilitation of injured Royal Air Force pilots and other military personnel.

I think for most people living nearby and/or having connections to DMRC Headley Court, there are mixed feelings —

- Firstly, of pride at what has been achieved from nothing to being a world leader in the rehabilitation and resettlement of severely injured military personnel, and
- secondly, sadness that because of its unique internationally acclaimed success it
 has outgrown what are now becoming limited facilities that could inhibit further
 progress.

On Friday, 29th September 2017 there is to be a Farewell March through Dorking of the DMRC Headley Court Staff and Patients together with local Veterans and Cadets. It is proposed that following a service at St Martins Church the Farewell March will start with a Salute outside the White Horse Hotel and proceed along Dorking High Street ending with an Inspection of the Troops at Pippbrook. 
Furlonger Tree Services Autumn Newsletter (Extract)

Autumn must be the Arborist's favourite season with work aplenty, the birds finishing nesting and the goldilocks nature of the weather, not too hot and not too cold! It's also the season when nature's artistry is at its best, particularly in this lovely green corner of our temperate, wooded country!

Did Yew Know? The Yew Tree (Taxus baccata) is Britain's oldest tree. Many Churches and Monasteries have ancient Yew Trees as they were considered holy even in pre-Christian times. Wikipedia will tell you that The Fortingall Yew in the churchyard of the village in Perthshire, Scotland is thought to be Britain's oldest, estimated at being between 2,000 and 3,000 years old.

That's a large margin of error there, and these guys might have something to say on which is Britain's oldest tree!

- The Anckerwycke Yew: There may be yew trees in Britain that are older but the 31-ft wide yew (Taxus baccata) found in the ruined priory of Ankerwycke in Berkshire has witnessed at least 2,000 years of history and myth-making. It is said to have been the spot where King John signed the Magna Carta in 1215 and is rumoured to be where Henry VIII conducted his first liaisons with Anne Boleyn.
- 2. **The Borrowdale Yew, Cumbria:** This tree can fit four people inside a hollow in its trunk. Another yew singled out by Wordsworth also survived storm damage and still stands in the village of Lorton, Cumbria. It was one of many under which John Wesley, the founder of Methodism, preached
- 3. **The Defynnog Yew:** This tree near Sennybridge, Powys has been subjected to several ageing tests including ring dating and DNA tests. If experts are to be believed this Welsh tree is one of Europe's oldest and could more than 5000 years old! Yew must be joking!





A Memorable Mill

Intrigued, I made enquiries and in June attended an evening service. There was an Alter with fresh flowers and a few pews and chairs in a semi-circle, and about fifteen attending the service in this delightful and novel setting.

The Mill was built in 1765 but ceased to 'grind' in about 1870. Ten years later it was converted into a chapel, under St. Mary' church, Reigate, and named St. Cross Chapel but it is better known as 'The Mill Church'.



In 1906, Reigate Heath Golf Club purchased the freehold the of piece of land which contained the Golf Club house. the Miller's Cottage and the Mill. The latter was then being leased to the Church by the club.

The sails were completely blown off in 1943 and not

replaced for 20 years. The Borough of Reigate Town Planning eventually purchased the Mill and new sails were fitted, each pair having a span of 65ft. and a width of 8ft.

Although a considerable amount of machinery is still in position inside the Mill, it really is delightful and well worth a visit.

The new £10 note is printed on polymer — a thin and flexible plastic material. It's around 15% smaller than the paper £10 note. On the front of the £10 polymer note (the side with raised print), there are two clusters of raised dots in the top left-hand corner. This tactile feature helps blind and partially sighted people identify the value of the note. Polymer notes provide enhanced counterfeit resilience and help increase the quality of notes in circulation.

Can I still use the paper £10 note?

You can continue to use the paper £10 note, featuring Charles Darwin, until it is withdrawn from circulation in Spring

2018. Notice will be given at least 3 months prior to the withdrawal date. Genuine Bank of England banknotes that have been withdrawn from circulation retain their face value for all time and can be exchanged at the Bank of England. Visit www.bankofengland.co.uk/banknotes/about/exchanges

£10 Design

The new £10 note incorporates enhanced security features. There are also a number of design elements relating to Jane Austen whose portrait can be found on the back of the note. The portrait was commissioned by James Edward Austen Leigh (Jane Austen's nephew) in 1870, adapted from an original sketch drawn by her sister Cassandra Austen in 1810. Next to the portrait is an illustration of Elizabeth Bennet, a character from *Pride and Prejudice*. The quote 'I declare after all there is no enjoyment like reading!' was said by Miss Bingley in *Pride and Prejudice*. Beneath this image is Godmersham Park House, the estate owned by Jane Austen's brother. The foil image over the window is Winchester Cathedral, where Jane Austen was buried in 1817, aged just 41. 2017, the year the note is launched, marks the 200th anniversary of her death.



The Journey

I start my journey in Tokyo, the most exciting metropolis in Asia, where traditions from centuries past exist side by side with the ever-moving elements of the latest in urban culture that radiate their own special heat and energy. Most of the clichés are true. Tokyo is neon-wrapped, a hectic playground where trains are never late, vending machines are everywhere and food doesn't always lie still on your plate, but amid the bright signs and adverts there is also a Zen-like calm, often just a few steps away from the chaos. There is no real centre to Tokyo rather it has sub-centres, connected by the circular Yamanote train line.



It takes under 3 hours on the 200mph bullet train from Tokyo to Kyoto, the cultural heart of Japan, an area spared from the air raids of WW2. On the journey, you can visit Hakone an area of natural beauty and UNESCO site and then Mt Fuji, Japan's spiritual home, since the mountain is covered in snow most of the year, the official climbing season is limited to July and August. The climb is worthwhile but not easy; a saying goes there are two kinds of fools - those that never climb Fuji and those that climb it twice.

Arriving in the ancient capital, Kyoto has numerous shrines, temples, palaces and villas, repositories of Japan's long history, while up in the low mountains that enclose the city small villages huddle under forested slopes, offering fascinating glimpses of rural life. You will still find geishas in the old Gion district, kimono weavers, sake breweries and numerous craftsmen and storekeepers who carefully maintain the old ways and keep alive the flame of Japan's traditional culture.

From Kyoto, you can visit Nara for its parks, temples and museums, while travelling you will feel safe, women can walk safely alone almost anywhere and it's not unusual to see children riding the subway alone whilst sleeping on trains seems to be a national pastime. Many belongings have been lost only to found them returned intact the very next day.

As I travel further south I now find myself in Hiroshima, a city remerged from the atomic bombing, the peace flame burns in front of the memorial cenotaph, never to be extinguished until all nuclear weapons are abolished. A short distance from Hiroshima is the beautiful island of Miyajima, home to the Itsukushima shrine a must see for all standing alone in the sea. The Shinto shrine is a world heritage site as is known as one of the 'three views of Japan'.

Miyajima island is a romantic place, best enjoyed staying overnight at one of the islands Ryokans a traditional Japanese Inn. Numerous superb hot spring resorts, known as 'onsens' are in fact ryokans built on the site of a hot spring. There are some 55,000 ryokans in Japan; a room in a ryokan will usually contain an undivided room floored with tatami matting, while sleeping on a 'futon' bedding laid out by maids and a traditional evening meal and breakfast.

My final stop is the beautiful island of Okinawa a chance to relax on a beautiful beach, sub-tropical, coral reefs, emerald seas, sunny skies and tropical vegetation abound. There are more than 150 islands stretching a chain of 250 miles. There is no litter and no bins either this is always taken home. This is an example of the remarkable social cohesion that Japan enjoys intertwined with its heart-warming hospitality makes it such a pleasant place to live and to visit. Japan awaits you
