



Latest Alerts

Motorists

Motorists are warned that when applying online for your driving licence, vehicle tax or to use other motoring services you should always make sure you use the official GOV.UK site.

DVLA is aware of problems with third party websites passing themselves off as DVLA, for example to customers who are applying for driving licences. Some sites exaggerate the nature of the services they provide, or deliberately underplay the services that people can get for free or at a lower cost from DVLA. These services are in no way affiliated with DVLA. In particular you may come across these websites in the sponsored links or paid-for results section when using online search engines.

These websites often claim to offer value-added services to ensure your application is correct before you send it to DVLA. However, using this service will mean you can end up paying as much as 3 times the normal price for your driving licence.

Protecting Your Home

A home that looks empty is more likely to be targeted by a burglar, use automatic timer-switches to turn on a light and perhaps a radio when it goes dark, even for just a couple of hours.

- Take photos of your expensive items and keep copies of them with your insurance policy.
- Think about fitting a small safe.
- For electronic or larger items, use a commercial or forensic marker which identifies the item as yours to increase your chance of getting it back if it's stolen.
- Do not close your curtains during the daytime; this can suggest your home is empty.
- A pile of post on the doormat is a clear sign that you are away. Ask a trusted neighbour to clear your post away, or use Royal Mail's "keepsafe" service; they will keep your mail for up to two months.
- Beware of bogus callers; use your spy hole and a door chain until you have seen their ID and are satisfied you want to let them in.
- Never discuss your security requirements or existing arrangements with a doorstep caller or salesperson

ACTION FRAUD — Latest Alerts (Continuation)

Amazon Scam

Action Fraud has received several reports from victims who have been sent convincing looking emails claiming to be from Amazon. The spoofed emails from "service@amazon.co.uk" claim recipients have made an order online and mimic an automatic customer email notification. The scam email claims recipients have ordered an expensive vintage chandelier. Other reported examples include: Bose stereos, iPhone's and luxury watches.

The emails cleverly state that if recipients haven't authorised the transaction they can click on the help centre link to receive a full refund. The link leads to an authentic-looking website, which asks victims to confirm their name, address, and bank card information.

Amazon says that suspicious e-mails will often contain:

- Links to websites that look like Amazon.co.uk, but aren't Amazon.co.uk.
- Attachments or prompts to install software on your computer.
- Typos or grammatical errors.
- Forged (or spoofed) e-mail addresses to make it look like the e-mail is coming from Amazon.co.uk.

Amazon will never ask for personal information to be supplied by e-mail. You can read more about identifying suspicious emails claiming to be from Amazon by visiting

District Councillor Box Hill & Headley

What a year 2016 turned out to be

Leaving aside international uncertainties regarding the change of the newly elected USA President, the uncertainties and horrors of events in the middle-east, I

believe that whilst 2017 may be a tough year the underlying indicators are that the British economy will improve once Brexit is invoked.

EU Brexit

A Referendum vote with a small majority in favour of Brexit resulted in a very mixed and uncertain effect on the economy. The stock market dropped but then climbed back to its highest level. The fall of GBP against EUR and USD pushing up some prices of imported goods but against this export sales are up for some UK goods and services.

As I previously stated there is going to be some price increases on some but not all goods that we import into UK. Against this I remain even more convinced that it will only be a temporary problem that will be overcome once our own farmers and manufacturers have stepped up production.

Once we are out of the EU we are our own masters free of petty burdensome EU legislation and can enter into trade deals with other countries as well as negotiating a better deal with EU. The EU, which sells more to us than we sell to them, would be a bigger loser than us if it does not agree a realistic trade deal with us.

NHS & Other Public Services

The NHS provides a unique and, compared to most other countries, a unique public service but, in addition to a growing public demand for its generally excellent services there are numerous underlying inefficiencies in the way it operates with a complicated management structure. The government needs to firmly resolve these underlying problems and to do this it needs to be supported by the relevant professions and trade unions to avoid its collapse resulting in inevitable job losses and a serious to the welfare of all those that cannot afford private medical care.

A different but similar situation arises with the privatised transport systems and other essential supply industries where the trade unions are trying to hold the government and fare paying public to ransom.

Update: Malcolm Ladell DC Box Hill & Headley (Continuation)

The fact is that for too many years since WW2 our various governments have overspent to meet these past ransom demands resulting in borrowing spiralling out of control and this will get worse when international interest rates increase. Raising taxation is not the answer as this would only reduce personal spending and result in industrial and retail job losses exacerbating rather than easing the situation and will contribute to the collapse of our economy and mass unemployment with extreme hardship on a scale comparable to that of the 1920's and 30's.

Regardless of political beliefs and position in life it is time for us all to put our shoulders to the wheel of work and get on with pulling our country of the financial mess that it is in for future benefit of our children and grandchildren.

In conclusion

I repeat my previous neighbourly request that now the winter weather is upon us please look out for infirm or elderly neighbours particularly those who live alone and check on them if you do not see them around for a day or so.

Surrey CC Highways have informed us of the temporary road closures detailed below, the effect of which will be to temporarily prohibit vehicles from entering or proceeding in the lengths of roads described in the Schedule to this Notice. This Order is required to enable A Plant Lux to carry out cabling and tree cutting works on behalf of BT.

These works are anticipated to be carried out over a total of two weeks as soon as possible between the hours of 09.30hrs and 15.30hrs within the three-month period of operation of this temporary Order that commences on 9th February 2017. The temporary closures will only operate when the relevant traffic signs are displayed.

SCHEDULE

- (a) That length of Church Lane, Headley, between its junction with Headley Common Road and its junction with Hurst Lane, a distance of 1233 metres.
 - a. Access will be maintained for pedestrians, residents and emergency vehicles at all times.
 - b. Access will be maintained for equestrians and cyclists at all times but both will need to dismount to pass these works.
 - c. Vehicular traffic will be diverted via Tot Hill, Leech Lane, Mill Way, Reigate Road, By-Pass Road (Leatherhead), Leatherhead Road, The Street, Epsom Road, Farm Lane, Headley Road, Tilley Lane, Clay Lane and Church Lane.
- (b) That length of Mill Way, Leatherhead and Leech Lane/Tot Hill, Headley from its junction with Church Lane for a distance of 1600 metres in a north westerly, westerly and then north westerly direction.
 - a. Access will be maintained for pedestrians, residents and emergency vehicles at all times.
 - b. Access will be maintained for equestrians and cyclists at all times but both will need to dismount to pass these works.
 - c. Vehicular traffic will be diverted via Headley Common Road, Pebble Hill Road, Station Road, Reigate Road, Deepdene Avenue, London Road, Mickleham By-Pass, Dorking Road, By-Pass Road (Leatherhead), Reigate Road and Mill Way.

SCC Highways state that these temporary road closures will not take place at the same time.




BOX HILL EVENING W.I.

The Ministry of Ungentlemanly Warfare: Churchill's Mavericks: Plotting Hitler's Defeat by *Giles Milton*

This is an outstanding book. It makes one feel extremely humble to learn about the people who devised the weapons and the exploits of those who carried out the subterfuge. From defending England's coastline in 1940, the destruction of Norway's heavy water plant, and to harassing the Nazi Panzer divisions reaching the invasion beaches, this is an amazing tale which deserves to be better known. I recommend this book.

Six gentlemen, one goal - the destruction of Hitler's war machine

In the spring of 1939, a top secret organisation was founded in London: its purpose was to plot the destruction of Hitler's war machine through spectacular acts of sabotage.

The guerrilla campaign that followed was to prove every bit as extraordinary as the six gentlemen who directed it. Winston Churchill selected them because they were wildly creative and thoroughly ungentlemanly. One of them, Cecil Clarke, was a maverick engineer who had spent the 1930s inventing futuristic caravans. Now, his talents were put to more devious use: he built the dirty bomb used to assassinate Hitler's favourite, Reinhard Heydrich. Another member of the team, William Fairbairn, was a portly pensioner with an unusual passion: he was the world's leading expert in silent killing. He was hired to train the guerrillas being parachuted behind enemy lines.

Led by dapper Scotsman Colin Gubbins, these men - along with three others - formed a secret inner circle that planned the most audacious sabotage attacks of the Second World War. Winston Churchill called it his Ministry of Ungentlemanly Warfare. The six 'ministers', aided by a group of formidable ladies, were so effective that they single-handedly changed the course of the war.

Told with Giles Milton's trademark verve and eye for detail, The Ministry of Ungentlemanly Warfare is thoroughly researched and based on hitherto unknown archival material. It is a gripping and vivid narrative of adventure and derring-do and is also, perhaps, the last great untold story of the Second World War.

Daphne Ladell, who died suddenly on 2nd December 2016, spent much of the last sixteen years of her life working tirelessly for the interests of Box Hill and its residents. She will be particularly remembered for the eleven years

she served as our District Councillor and all the major events she organised on our behalf through the Box Hill Neighbourhood Council – but there was much more behind the scenes work she undertook too.

In 2014 Daphne underwent complex lifesaving major surgery. In 2016 she had further surgery and having recovered she was going full-out on preparations the Christmas Santa Parade and Carol Singalong and the Christmas decorations of her house when, in her words, she "had a funny turn". Daphne was rushed to hospital and died that same night.



Daphne's husband, Malcolm has provided a more personal insight, and wrote:

"A very young Daphne and I met walking our dogs in Wandle Park in 1965. We married in 1966 and our first child was born later that year. We had four more children, including one who died and one who we adopted; although during that period she did take on part-time office work, her time was mainly taken up looking after the home and children. In the late 1970's Daphne started her cake making and catering business which by the 1980's had transformed into an accomplished and successful provider of

confidential boardroom meeting lunches for international financiers in the City of London.

IN MEMORY — DAPHNE LADELL (continuation)

"As the children grew up Daphne became actively interested in the local community in the 1990's and became a member of the Box Hill Neighbourhood Council. She organised opposition against a proposed housing development within the Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty of Box Hill and gave evidence at the Public Appeal Hearing that upheld the planning refusal by MVDC. Following on from that she was asked to stand and was elected the MVDC Councillor for the then newly created Box Hill & Headley MVDC Ward which she held for 11 years until she decided to retire in 2011. During that 11 years she acted with quiet determination getting on with the job of working for, and helping the residents of Box Hill and Headley."



"Over the last 25 years Daphne's hobby was a growing passion for mechanical music in all its various forms and she became an accomplished internationally recognised collector and restorer with a workshop that would be the envy of many



an engineer, carpenter or fitter. Her eclectic collection encompasses small wind up and battery powered childlike toys, antique 18th to 20th century music boxes, 1940's jukeboxes, large complex organs with multiple instruments etc., most of which she maintained herself. This interest resulted in long standing family friendships with people from very different backgrounds and beliefs across the world."

"I was fortunate to have been pursued by, and married to Daphne and owe her a great deal for her support over the 50 years of

our marriage. She will be greatly missed by me and my family together with many others who knew her over the almost 34 years we have lived on the Box Hill she loved since regularly visiting it as a child with her parents."

"Finally, I feel it important to publicly the express my, and my family's sincere thanks to the NHS staff, nurse and duty doctor at the Hillside Surgery, the ambulance service crew, East Surrey Hospital A&E and EMU doctors and staff who promptly did everything they could to save Daphne."

Glenys Sahay wrote: "We all know that Daphne worked tirelessly and with great enthusiasm for our village. Over many years now we have shared the same hopes and convictions through good times and bad. She was always there for me, and ready with support and advice. I have not only lost a friend but an ally, and without her I feel diminished."

Val Cross wrote: "As soon as we had moved to Box Hill in 1999 Daphne called at our new home just as soon as we were settling in as she had heard that Ron Lubbock was good with figures and she needed a Treasurer! You didn't like to say NO to Daphne - hence a long association with the BHNC ensued. Ron and Daphne became firm friends until Ron died in 2014."

Coran Foddering (Box Hill Computer Project) wrote: "On the 11th January 2017, we gathered round the kitchen table for the final committee meeting of the Box Hill computer club. Meeting without Daphne was a challenge as she had passed on the day of our very last club get together to say goodbye to friends who had been with us for several years; we were closing our doors after 11 years. Little did we know that we were also saying goodbye to a friend in Daphne who I saw for the last time doing what she does best — doing things for other people and bringing food and drink to the village hall for our final celebration.

The kitchen table was covered in paper, unopened envelopes, receipts and other boxes full to the brim of bank statements, invoices and the like. As I sifted through the paperwork trying to find the kitchen table, I was moved by the thought of how big a footprint we leave as we pass beyond the veil. Very few of us leave a footprint the size of Daphne's as she had been a key part of village life for many a year. She touched the lives of many in the village and beyond in her role as a councillor but also as a human being.

Letting go is one of the most difficult things to do. I will struggle as I have to let go of both the computer club and Daphne. Yes, the universe will bring things to fill those vacant spaces but the underlying loss never truly goes away; it gets manageable. Daphne's footprints have finally stopped in this mortal coil but they continue in another domain."

You have always supported us as a business but even me personally when things got on top. Nothing was ever too much. Daphne you will never be forgotten. How lucky we are to have known someone like you, a prime example of unselfish dedication to our community. Thank you for being you."



Cuba, a country that steals your soul by Lucia Raffaini

Last September our family took a fascinating trip to a country steeped in history and somewhat stuck in a time warp, the Caribbean island of Cuba.

Havana is a cultural melting pot, fascinating in its colonial grandeur, beautiful architecture and in the diversity of its citizen. Every street seems to have a story to tell and of course there are those gorgeous cars of the 40's, 50's and 60's. Rows of parked Cadillacs, Chevrolets and other models, for hire as taxis, create a rainbow of colour at street level, a sight that any lover of classic cars will not forget.

Our tour guide was extremely knowledgeable and so we were educated in the country's history throughout our trip. Watching cigars being made at a cigar factory was an eye opener, and we ate some wonderful food. The lobster was especially delicious eaten in one of Cuba's private house restaurants and we even had a cocktail-making event in one of Havana's oldest bars.

Trinidad, our next stopover, is a beautiful colonial town steeped in grandeur, with many of its buildings adorned with French chandeliers and Italian frescoes. We



stayed in a beautifully restored colonial palace, situated on the Plaza Major and from our balcony we had clear view over the square and Cuban life being played out there. We took a drive in a 1957 Fairlane Convertible to a public beach not far from Trinidad and enjoyed the best Mojito whilst strolling along this lovely stretch of soft sand.

The port city of Cienfuegos was next

for one night. Having been occupied by French immigrants from Bordeaux and Louisiana, it felt more 'French' than 'Spanish' with its sprawling boulevards. But once again there is beautiful architecture to behold. We especially loved the Tomas Terry Theatre National Monument right in the centre of the city.

Our final stop was in Viñales, to the far west of Cuba. Viñales, a traditional Cuban town has a warm and friendly vibe about it, staying in a Casa Particular (Cuba's equivalent to a B & B) we felt totally at home. From here we visited the Indian caves, a wonderful large network of caves, with great stalagmites and stalactites, and an Indian Village. Sad to be leaving we spent our last evening in a small bar across the street from our residence. With its exposed dance floor in the centre, this bar produced the most potent Mojitos, and wonderful entertainment. We listened to some amazing live music, watched some beautiful dancers and when invited to join them, I was in Salsa heaven!

Cuba is an intoxicating place, just can't wait to go back again!



DOG GROOMING DAYS

A massive thank you for the donations you gave for *The Greyhound Trust*. We receive a lot of gents' ties; we have washing up liquid, tins of pilchards in tomatoes sauce, bin bags, bonios and used postage stamps. Please keep the donations coming as most of these items are used on a daily basis. Also another massive thank you for the items new and/or unused

for the tombola/s we hope to attend this year in aid of *The Greyhound Trust*.

Well 9th January of this year saw me reach 40 years in dog grooming. I look back and think where "have those years gone"? It doesn't seem five minutes ago that I was walking to school with my mates.

So where did the idea of me dog grooming spring from?

Our first dog was a German Shepherd, followed by a Toy Poodle 'Kim' who went every 6 - 8 weeks to the grooming parlour in the next town Baldock for his lamb cut. I remember one of my late uncles saying "and what do you want to do when you grow up"? Without any hesitation I replied "I'm going to clip Poodles". I was five years old and had no idea that other dogs frequented the dog grooming parlour.

At school with this still in my mind, I chose to do a Business Studies Course, so that one day if I did run my own business, I would have some knowledge of the business side of things. Then I left school and went to work as secretary/receptionist to an optician in my home town of Letchworth Garden City. I know that seems an odd thing to do, but I had no knowledge of dealing with customers and I also wanted to put what I had learnt in school into practice.

I never lost my goal and after five years, I decided to get a move on and achieve my dream. This was difficult as most dog groomers worked from home and did not want assistants. The only way I could learn was to go to a boarding kennels and cattery where they included a dog grooming business. I was advised at the time to buy a dog paper *Our Dogs* or *Dog World*, as they had adverts in the back that may be of help to me. I wrote to three. Only one got back to me and that was a Surrey based kennels and cattery. I was interviewed and got the job. This required me to live in, so at the grand old age of 21 years I left home. Working in an establishment such as this is so different to what it is now. As I had full board and lodging that was considered part of my salary, so what I actually earned was £10 a week. Quite a come down in salary from the opticians.

I was there for a month's trial. All my work was outside whatever the weather and this just involved cleaning, I had nothing to do with the animals. After one month, my bosses decided what I had done was good and I went on to do a further two months making it a three month trial. This involved inside work as well as outside. I still had nothing to do with the animals. What followed was a further three months trial making the whole trial six months and in the final three months I got to deal with dogs only. I also got a pay rise to £65 a month. After a year I was allowed to bath and groom the dogs. In my third year, I got to clip. Hooray!

I had always thought that I would learn my trade and go back to Letchworth Garden City and open up a business there, as at the time there was still no dog grooming shops, but I loved what I was doing where I was. I was at the kennels 26 years, 18 years as Manageress. We were one of the best kennels in the country. People travelled from all over the country just to board with us. We had the reputation of sending out pets better than they had come in, and on the whole most dogs pulled their owners to come into us. The kennel owners encouraged us to climb a ladder of education. I did a Small Animal Care Course, Canine/Human Interface, followed by more Animal Care Courses and finally the Kennel Management Diploma. We had to work all hours, and all the busy times, so when pet owners went away all bank holidays, this included Christmas and New Year, plus the summer months - we had to work. Many a time it was a 15 hour day, but I loved it.

Before I came Manageress, the head dog groomer who herself later became Manageress before me - Janet, taught me to clip. I owe her a great deal as she was just brilliant at dog grooming. I worked for four different kennel bosses, taking over the dog grooming in the 1990's as my own business. When my fourth boss chose to retire, I decided to call it a day as well and concentrate purely on dog grooming. I moved my business to where it is now, where I have been since 2002.

Over the years, many of my customers have become friends that I socialize with and those that no longer have dogs still keep in touch with me which is so nice. I am grateful that I have good staff around me, including a young girl who worked for me in my early days who I will never forget, gave up so much of her time including Sundays to help with the backlog of dogs when I had to close for two weeks when my Father died. As I have said I have been so lucky, customers have been loyal, but most of all I would like to say something about all the dogs that have come to me past and present. I have gained much respect for you, have learnt a great deal and for that, I thank you.

Computer User's Corner

Good to Know – Keeping your Data Safe

We are often surprised that in particular months of the year we see an increased frequency in particular products failing - for example in January, February and March we see an increase in hard drives failing; in April / May it's monitors and displays; in June and July it's networking and routers; in October to November it's printers. Obviously a product can fail at any time, but we have often seen this trend repeating. With this in mind we are often surprised by the number of people who have the only copy of their cherished photos or significant information on a single external hard drive, which you've guessed fails.

The recovery of data can be an uncertain, protracted and sometimes very costly exercise, and this is entirely avoidable.

The two most popular backup routes to prevent this from happening are:

- Backup to the Cloud** This can be automatic and very low cost, we have a few options which are simple to install and require no intervention or user involvement, or
- 2) A local backup to a NAS device with multiple hard drives- A NAS or Network Attached Storage drive, is a small box with, usually, four hard drives installed. The NAS divides your data across all four drives, meaning that should one hard drive fail in the NAS your data will still be available to use and access. By replacing the failed hard drive in the NAS, your data we will be rebuilt by the NAS with no loss. A 4-drive NAS device with 4x 1Tb hard drives can cost as little as £500, making this a very cost effective solution.



Microsoft Update Problem

Late last year there was a Microsoft update which disabled all the networking on a machine. The fix is quite simple if you can follow 4 or 5 steps. For your convenience we have detailed these steps on the 'downloads' page on our website www.tecres.co.uk.

Our current exhibition: Dorking Museum's spring exhibition opened at the end of January and focuses on 'Medieval Betchworth'. The exhibition was prepared in association with the Betchworth Village Archives team and gives a flavour of everyday life in a small medieval village in the 13th to 15th centuries. It tells of the lords of the manor, working on the land, growing wheat and keeping sheep, and the role of the church in the community. Bread was a staple of the villagers' diet, so the water mill on the River Mole was particularly important to mill the grain. In 1300, a new mill-stone was required and had to be transported from London – the exhibition tells of the cost and effort this required to enable vital milling to be resumed.

But it also gives a more surprising view of this neglected period. It explores the experience of the 14th century Black Death, which took the lives of half of the villagers, and the impact that this had on the community. It tells of Royal visits to the village (Henry III, Edward I, and, notably, the French Crown Prince Louis, from whom The Dolphin may take its name) and follows the story of Thomas Morsted of More House, Betchworth, who was Henry V's chief surgeon at the Battle of Agincourt in 1415.

Untold servants' stories explored

The house at Polesden Lacey is now open every day until 30th March with a new seasonal programme called Rules and Roller Skates: the perks of a life in service; this will explore what Polesden's hardworking servants got up to in their precious spare time while their mistress, Maggie Greville, was travelling the world or socialising elsewhere.



New opening arrangements: Until now the house has been closed on winter weekdays to allow the rooms to rest. Now for the first time, this flagship National Trust property will be open every day as different rooms are revealed. For the first time visitors will be able to access backstairs areas like the servants hall and the attic bedrooms where the male servants slept.

Work-life balance: Over the years, the house team have made contact with various surviving members of staff or their relatives in order to collect reminiscences about the time they spent in service. These accounts reveal that Polesden's servants were a tightknit community who worked, lived and played together. Some even found love with a little help from Mrs Greville, a notorious matchmaker.



Mrs Greville encouraged a strong community amongst her staff including an annual servants' ball and a thriving social club. Servants from across the property would meet here to enjoy a drink, play darts and billiards, or peruse the reading library. which was generously stocked by Mrs Greville.

The use of the 18-hole golf course, tennis courts and a competitive cricket team, well placed in the local

leagues, all reveal the thriving social scene Polesden Lacey staff enjoyed in their hard earned leisure time.
