

CASE 1:

Man claiming to be from the "water company" to gain access to a house in Dorking.

Water Company officials do not need to access your home to test water pressure or repair a leak!! Enquiries ongoing - please look out for vulnerable neighbours / relations. Don't hesitate to call us if you are suspicious of any callers to your door. https://surrey.police.uk/.../protect-yourself.../doorstep-crime/

Actions you can take to avoid doorstep crime: Spotting bogus officials

Bear the following in mind if you suspect that an 'official' caller may not be genuine:

- Water company officials do not need to access your home to test water pressure or repair a leak
- If access required, they will write to you to arrange a suitable appointment
- Gas or electricity company officials expect you to check their identity before letting them in. They don't mind waiting why you do so
- If you have any doubts, don't let the caller in. Phone the company to confirm they are genuine. Use a number from utility bill and not one the caller gives you
- Set up a password system with your utility providers. This is a free service.

ACTION FRAUD ALERTS (Continuation)

Bogus workmen can be very persistent in persuading you that urgent work needs to be carried out on your property.

Our advice is: Never agree to have work done by someone who turns up on your doorstep. Say No.

CASE 2:

In February, Tools were stolen from a workshop in Woodlands Park, Box Hill.

- Check your shed and garage for signs of decay, which may provide an opportunity for a thief.
- Look to strengthen the door and frame, hinges should be secured with coach bolts or non-return screws. Use strong padbars and close shackle padlocks.
- Register expensive items with a commercial database or use a forensic marker to increase your chance of getting it back if it's stolen.



WARREN PARK SITE OWNER DIES



This Vardo (a traditional horse-drawn wagon used by British Romani) was on the cover of the Order of Services for William's funeral.

William Crittenden was not a resident of Box Hill, but as the family director responsible for the oversight of the residential park home site Warren Park, he had close contact with the village.

Park home manager Alan Peppiatt described Mr Crittenden, known as Billy by his family, as an excellent man to work for, a man of his word who relied on a handshake rather than putting things in writing.

William died on 23rd January 2018, aged 81, and his funeral was held on 19th February at St John's Church, West Wickham, near the area where he lived.

TRIBUTE TO JOHN ALLINSON



Mike Fox, Chair of Tadworth & Walton Overseas Aid Trust (TWOAT), sent us the following statement: "I am sorry to pass on the very sad news that John Allinson, Deputy Chair of TWOAT, passed away after a long struggle with cancer at 1.30am on 12th February

As you may know, he was awarded the MBE last year for his services to good causes, in general and in particular to Tadworth & Walton Overseas Aid Trust of which he was one of the original founders and the first Chairman.

Unfortunately, he was already too unwell last December to go to Buckingham Palace and receive his medal from the Queen. In consequence his family asked me to present the medal to him in his bedroom on Saturday 3rd February and this I did in the company of several members of his friends and family. John could only speak in a whisper, but he did say that he thought the award was really to all the supporters of TWOAT who had helped the charity make a difference in many people's lives.

Proposal for double yellow lines along parts of Boxhill Road to be presented at BHNC Meeting starting at 8pm on Monday 5th March

I have been in communication with Box Hill Neighbourhood Council (BHNC), our SCC Councillor Hazel Watson and the Police regarding the increase in the number of vehicles dangerously parked too close to road junctions and driveways that obstructs the view for drivers of vehicles turning into Boxhill Road. In one recent incident the Police removed and impounded a vehicle as it had totally obstructed access by being parked across a driveway.

Whilst I have not been a keen supporter of double yellow lines, because I feel it suburbanises a semi-rural village such as ours, I now feel that we have little or even no choice in the interests of road safety and to avoid a serious or even fatal accident.

This proposal will be presented jointly by SCC Councillor Hazel Watson and myself at the Box Hill Neighbourhood Council meeting being held in the Village Hall starting at 8pm on Monday 5th March.

Future Mole Valley – Rural Villages such as Box Hill Presentation at Box Hill Neighbourhood Council Meeting on Monday 5th March

Following on from my article in the January issue of Box Hill News a Mole Valley District Council Planning Officer will give an outline and answers questions on what can and cannot be done to increase housing and help improve life in small semi-rural villages that are within an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB) adjacent to areas of Great Landscape Value and of Special Scientific Interest.

Surrey County Council Proposing to extend RideLondon to 2024

Below is a copy of an email I have sent to Mole Valley District Council and to Surrey County Council raising concerns that have been expressed to me by some residents of Box Hill and Headley.

"Thank you for your email advising me and other elected Members of MVDC that SCC has contacted MVDC regarding Surrey hosting the Prudential RideLondon-Surrey 100 and Classic events for a further 5 years. Presumably this would take it to 2024 as it had already been approved for a further two years to 2019.

Surrey County Council Proposing to extend RideLondon to 2024 (Continuation)

As the elected Mole Valley District Councillor for Box Hill & Headley, I am disappointed that neither I or, to my knowledge, Councillor David Mir as the Mole Valley District Councillor for Leith Hill have been directly consulted about this by Surrey County Council. I believe we represent the only two communities within Mole Valley that are 'totally locked-in' from early morning to early evening with just one very short break at some unpredictable time in the early afternoon.

Not only are our two communities and other non-cycling visitors to the unique areas of Box Hill and Leith Hill deprived of free access on the day of the event they are also inconvenienced throughout much of the year by the influx of practising cyclists some of whom have an arrogant disregard of other road users including walkers, horse riders etc.

Some residents of Box Hill, particularly those who have lived there for many years accept the fact that it is, and has been since the early 1900's, a leisure area that now has an almost one million visitors predominately in the summer months each year. I have a copy of an early photograph of long skirted ladies riding donkeys across the road at the Donkey Green. Motor cyclists were regular visitors on a Sunday since way back in the 1930's, horse riders and carriages, some driven by me and my friends in the 1980's & 90's slowed the traffic at weekends, but none were as aggressive or ill-mannered by some, but not all, cyclists.

The residents of Box Hill get just two minor benefits from the Ride London events; one being the prompt (albeit temporary) filling of potholes in the road prior to the event, and the other being that Box Hill Neighbourhood Council (BHNC) is allowed to operate a feed station. Because the feed station is run by volunteer residents and their friends, it is able to make a small profit that enables it to make modest contributions to small local social and fitness clubs that meet at Box Hill Village Hall. This arrangement for BHNC was first established for the 2012 Olympic event by my late wife in 2010 when she was District Councillor, and more recently by BHNC negotiating directly with the Ride London Route Director. Against that small benefit Hilltop Stores and the Smith & Western lose their important Sunday trade due to the loss of access for customers most of whom do not live on Box Hill.

The only residential part of Headley to be totally cut-off is Headley Common Road to Tot Hill, Leech Lane and Crabtree Lane, plus the loss of access via Mill Lane and Reigate Road to the Surrey Wild Life Trust Educational Centre at Nower Wood, the Beaverbrook Hotel and Golf Club. Improved and larger warning notices are

needed prior to the sharp turn from Headley Common Road into Tot Hill where members of the Headley Parish Council voluntary station themselves to assist crashed cyclists.

What happened to the suggestion that future Ride London events would alternately use Box Hill and Leith Hill rather than both at the same time each year?"

This email has been copied to the Leader of Surrey County Council, the SCC Cabinet Member for Highways, the SCC Member for Dorking Hills, the SCC Member for Dorking Rural, the Leader of Mole Valley District Council, the Leader of the Mole Valley Liberal-Democrats, the Leader of Mole Valley Independents, the Member of Parliament for Mole Valley, Mole Valley District Councillor David Mir for Leith Hill, Box Hill Neighbourhood Council and Headley Parish Council."

Although the request for comments was restricted to Local Councillors and the original deadline of Friday 23rd February for making responses will have closed by the time you read this. However, I have since been advised that comments from residents living in areas that are totally cut-off will be considered. Computer User's Corner

Problems after a Windows software update?

The Windows update system has been a focus for us during February as we have seen a problem caused to machines which

were originally Windows 7 or Windows 8 and took the Windows 10 update as an upgrade.

As a part of the Windows update process, some important files are downloaded to a hidden partition on your PC's hard drive, however the new downloaded files are larger than the available space on the hidden partition on the hard drive. The solution for this is not an easy one, as it involves resizing all the partitions available on the "c drive". This is not something that the average user can do, plus there is a possibility the resizing can fail, rendering your machine not bootable with major access issues to your data.

Although it doesn't address this problem, there are ways that you can control some of your Windows updates - this is by going to your Start button, and then to *Settings > Update & security > Windows Update* and select *Check* for updates. We would always encourage you to take the latest Windows updates as this ensures you are kept secure.

Data Backup

We can't stress the importance of data backup, we do provide automatic cloud data backup as a part of our Total Care Support package.

If you would prefer to make your own backup arrangements Windows 10 has a very easy to use feature called "File History". This is a continuous backup program which copies your data to an external drive from your data Libraries, desktop and contacts folder. Once it has created a master backup it copies changed data every hour (by default) to your external drive.



It is fast and effective, our only recommendation once you have created a backup is not lot leave the backup drive adjacent to your computer as both devices would be impacted in the same way in the event of a fire or flood, so keep your backup drive else-where.

You can backup on to a memory stick or an external hard drive, the costs of which range for £8.00 and go up from there.

FEEDING THE WILDLIFE

Several people on Surrey Hills Park have asked me if I would mention the feeding of wildlife in a public place, in the hopes that it would stop. As one person said to me, they have no problem of feeding wildlife, but not

when it causes problems. At first I was not going to mention it in these articles, as when the weather has been really bad with hard ground and snow I have been known to feed wildlife myself and what has it got to do with dogs and dog grooming anyway, but then I thought it does concern dogs in more ways than one and would by mentioning it lead me into the problems that can affect dogs, but I suspect not just on Surrey Hills we feed wildlife. I am sure we probably think we are helping the wildlife, not realising we may not necessarily be and the problems that arise from doing so.

The jury is out on whether it is right or wrong. Many wildlife experts say it is fine to feed wildlife, where other experts say it is not, so who are we to believe. It all gets very confusing.

There is often food on Surrey Hills Park by the public bench near the office. I have on some occasions last year seen a couple of foxes go there to eat but thought nothing of it - until I saw the rats. As for these two foxes, who got into the habit of coming to this food source - they had distinct markings, so were easily recognisable - sadly it did them no good, as they were run over and killed on this park home site. Perhaps if they had not been enticed to come in the first place they may still be alive. Who knows? They could just have easily been killed on the roads off site.

Foxes' preferred food is rodents and birds and a wide variety of other food such as earthworms, fruit, insects and vegetables. It is said feeding processed foods to any wildlife is not doing them any favours, yet some say they can eat tinned dog food and bread, which is processed. Again confusing. Putting bread out can attract birds as well and it is now a known fact that sliced bread is not that good for birds, especially the young, but more on the birds later. How many of us have given milk and bread to hedgehogs not realising that it causes diarrhoea and can kill them. Not that you will see many hedgehogs locally, as their main predator is the badger and we have a few of those as well.

All this, however, leads me on to dogs. Some years ago, a dog on a lead made a quick move and grabbed a mouthful of food left out for the wildlife before the owner could stop her. The dog died as a result. So, whoever wanted to be kind to the wildlife killed a much-loved family dog instead.

DOG GROOMING DAYS (Continuation)

Those of you with dogs will know all about lungworm. It is spread by slugs and snails and can kill a dog if not treated in time. Foxes are known to spread the lungworm in their faeces, but we cannot just blame the foxes here. Those pet owners that do not pick up after their dog are also aiding the spread of lungworm. Now I know the argument is that all dogs should be treated for lungworm, because it can kill, but in not every dog gets protected.

We then have the problem of the rats. Thankfully we have not seen hundreds of them, but they can spread Leptospirosis (also known as Weil's disease). This does not just affect dogs, but humans as well.

I have been told that foxes with sarcoptic mange can pass this onto a dog, but the dog would have to be in contact with the fox or near a fox's den, so the chances of getting this mite from foxes is unlikely. This is fatal to foxes, but thankfully dogs can be treated and can make a full recovery. If left untreated in dogs, secondary problems can emerge which can be fatal.

Those of us who have dogs need to be extra careful when feeding birds. One of my customers dogs died after eating grass that contained birdseed that his owner had given to the birds on a cold winters day. It had fallen off the birdseed table. The reason why birds should not be eating certain types of bread is that it is heavily processed and contains chemicals and preservatives. It contains little protein which birds need for muscle and feather growth. Too much bread will cause health problems, but if you still want to feed birds, then multi grain bread is good. Peanut butter, fat drippings, birdseed, raisons and some dried fruit could be pressed into the bread, not to mention pumpkin seeds. Again, make sure your dog does not get a hold of it.

Wildlife need to forage for themselves. It's how they learn not to become reliant on us. Would I feed wildlife? Yes, I would, but only if it is a bad winter when their food is in short supply. I would keep to a routine, but not every day. Only put out small quantities so that it's all eaten up to avoid leftovers being eaten by vermin. This also means that dogs being walked nearby will not make a sudden dash to grab leftover, mouldy stale food causing them health problems.

Personally, if I was going to feed wildlife, I would feed them in the confines of my own garden, so hopefully it would not bother anyone else.



A BRIEF HISTORY OF MOTHERING SUNDAY

So, is it Mothering Sunday or Mother's Day? And how did this annual celebration of maternity begin anyway?

Everyone celebrates Mother's Day in their own way, from kids preparing mum a muchdeserved breakfast in bed, to older children treating their mother to a quintessentially



British afternoon tea. But while we see it as a universally beloved day of affection and celebration, Mothering Sunday isn't technically what you think it is. It's not even the same thing as Mother's Day.

THE ORIGINAL "MOTHERING SUNDAY"

Mothering Sunday began as an explicitly religious event of the 16th Century, with no connection to mothers at all. The word "mothering" referred to the "mother church", which is to say the main church or cathedral of the region. It became a tradition that, on the fourth Sunday of Lent, people would return to their mother church for a special service. This pilgrimage was apparently known as "going amothering", and became something of a holiday event, with domestic servants



traditionally given the day off to visit their own families as well as their mother church.

SIMNEL CAKE

One of the tastiest traditions of Mothering Sunday was the baking of Simnel cake. Often regarded as a purely Easterrelated confection, this rich fruit cake is also tied to Mothering Sunday as a bit of

indulgence to make up for the general austerity of Lent (and a nice home-baked present to take home to your mother). Consisting of layers of cake and marzipan, a traditional Simnel cake also reflects the religious overtones of the event by being adorned with 11 balls of marzipan, representing all the disciples of Jesus, minus Judas.

SAVING MOTHERING SUNDAY

Despite its long existence in British culture, Mothering Sunday eventually fell out of fashion at the dawn of the 20th Century. This is where a lady named Constance Penswick-Smith (left) enters the picture. The daughter of a vicar, she thought the loss of Mothering Sunday was a great shame, and worked hard to rekindle interest, even writing a book whose title clearly laid out her ambition - it was called The Revival of Mothering Sunday. As if that wasn't enough, she also founded the Society for the Observance of Mothering Sunday. Her determination paid off, and the fading festival was

restored to the culture of the country, only with much more of a focus on celebrating motherhood. And this was due to an American influence...

MOTHER'S DAY

So, if our event is properly called Mothering Sunday, what is "Mother's Day"? Technically speaking it's a completely unrelated American event, invented by a woman called Anna Jarvis in 1908. Her initial inspiration was a desire to honour her own mother, who had been a militant peace activist during the US Civil War. Anna Jarvis's growing ambition to create a formal "Mother's Day" for all American mothers was literally laughed out of the room at first, with officials jokingly saying that it might lead to a "Mother-in-Law's Day". Anna Jarvis wasn't easily put off, though, and in 1914 US President Woodrow Wilson officially signed Mother's Day into existence.

THE REVOLT AGAINST MOTHER'S DAY

It was Anna Jarvis who inspired our own Constance Penswick-Smith to revive the more religiously-flavoured Mothering Sunday in the UK, although the two separate events have since become conflated in most people's minds. Interestingly, Anna Jarvis was the first person to condemn the growing commercialisation of Mother's Day, and she started organising boycotts of the event she herself had created. One of her anti-Mother's Day protests even led to her arrest for disturbing the peace. She was particularly appalled by ready-made Mother's Day cards, saying "A printed card means nothing except that you are too lazy to write to the woman who has done more for you than anyone in the world." Buying chocolates was a no-no as well. "You take a box to Mother," she scoffed, "and then eat most of it yourself. A pretty sentiment!"

How can 'Help to Buy' help you to buy?




Daughter of the House by Rosie Thomas




Restoration. The Rebuilding of Windsor Castle by Adam Nicholson



The Museum is currently showing a new short film about the extraordinary local suffrage campaigners, Emmeline and

Frederick Pethick-Lawrence, largely filmed at the couple's former home, The Dutch House in South Holmwood, at Dorking Museum and on Leith Hill. Local historian, Kathy Atherton, who narrates the film, has been much in demand, with appearances on Surrey TV, Radio Surrey and the BBC's 100 Women, a new book "Suffragettes, Suffragists and Antis – the Fight for the Vote in the Surrey Hills" (available at the Museum) and another, "Suffragette Planners and Plotters – the Pankhurst/Pethick-Lawrence Story" due soon. The annual **Leith Hill Musical Festival** begins this month with a performance of Handel's Messiah and the youth choir competitions. Each year as we approach Easter, the festival choir gives a performance of one of the Bach Passions or, as happens this year, of Handel's great oratorio *The Messiah*. This is always a very moving occasion, an opportunity to hear a major choral work sung by a large choir. The performance will be conducted by Jonathan Willcocks, with orchestra and soloists. The youth choir competition is always very popular, with about twenty school choirs and other young people's choirs taking part – and always showing a very high standard of singing. The main festival concerts will follow in April.

Continuing the choral theme, **Brockham choral society** will perform Vaughan Williams' *A Sea Symphony*. This is a large-scale work for chorus, orchestra and soloists, setting words by Walt Whitman. It was Vaughan Williams' first symphony and it contains much great music, ranging in tone from grand and powerful to quiet and visionary. The concert will also include one of VW's most popular – and beautiful – works, his rhapsody for violin and orchestra, *The Lark Ascending*.

The Dorking Philharmonia has a programme of music from the classical era: Mozart's overture to *The Marriage of Figaro*, Weber's first clarinet concerto, Beethoven's first symphony, and Haydn's symphony no.59, known as the *Fire symphony*.

The Sacconi string quartet give the last of their three recitals for the Dorking Concertgoers. Their programme begins with a Haydn quartet and then explores a Czech theme. They will play Dvořák's *American quartet*, one of his best-loved chamber works full of infectious melodies, and Janáček's *Intimate Letters*, a highly emotional and passionate piece, reflecting the composer's intimate friendship with a young woman.

The lunchtime recital at St Martin's church will be given by violinist Fumi Otsuka and pianist Alessandro Viale. Their programme will include Elgar's *Chanson de nuit*, music by Finzi, Fauré, Boulanger and Debussy, and also Vaughan Williams' *The Lark Ascending*.


Letter from the Rector

I have two images for you as we look ahead to Palm Sunday, Holy Week, Good Friday and Easter day all rolled into one.

The 1st image is a painting. There is a painting in Manchester City Art Gallery by the Victorian artist William Holman Hunt called "The Shadow of Death". His most famous work is

called "The Light of the world" and depicts an adult Jesus knocking on the door of someone's life to see if they will open up to Him.

But I like "The Shadow of Death" even more. It was painted between 1870-73, in oil on canvas, and shows a 13-year old Jesus stretching at the end of a day in the Carpenter's shop. He is tired and looking forward to a rest and the setting sun makes his stretching shadow fall on the wall behind him and the shelf on the wall suggests the crossbar of the cross on which he would be nailed 20 years later. His mother Mary looks up and is transfixed by the shadow. The Blurb from the Gallery says: "Hunt combines everyday detail with religious



symbolism to create a painting rich in suggestion and meaning. An imaginary moment in the life of Christ contains symbolically His life and suffering. The shadow of Christ's outstretched arms foretells his crucifixion. The kneeling Virgin Mary opens a casket containing gifts from the Magi, recalling Christ's birth. To make the Biblical scenery as accurate as possible, Hunt travelled repeatedly to Jerusalem and took great pains to recreate exactly what he saw. Some critics deplored the depiction of Christ as a working man, but the painting was immensely popular, and over 4,000 engravings of it were printed."

So, we remember that Jesus was born (in a sense) to die. The focal point of the Mission (which he chose to accept) was his death on the Cross.

The 2nd image comes from a market, with people buying and selling, perhaps a transaction is taking place for something very valuable and as payment is received this word rings out – "*Tetelestai*". The word comes from the Greek verb *teleo*, which means "to bring to an end, to complete, or to accomplish." It's a crucial word because it signifies the successful end to a particular course of action. It's the word you would use when you climb to the summit of Mt. Everest; it's the word you use when you cross the finish line of your first marathon.

The word means more than just "I survived." It means "I did exactly what I set out to do." But there's more here than the verb itself. *Tetelestai* is in the perfect tense in Greek. That's significant because the perfect tense speaks of an action which has been completed in the past with results continuing

into the present. It's different from the past tense which looks back to an event and says, "This happened." The perfect tense adds the idea that "This happened, and it is still in effect today."

When Jesus cried out "It is finished," he meant "It was finished in the past, it is still finished in the present and it will remain finished in the future." But what was finished? What was he doing on the Cross?

To go back to the image of the market place, Tetelestai was used in the first and second centuries in the sense of "fulfilling" or "paying" a debt and often appeared in receipts. "It is finished" or Tetelestai can be interpreted as saying "Paid in full."

In that sense Jesus was making clear that his death had been accepted as a payment for all our rebellion and wrongdoing. He said of himself that he had come "to give his life as a ransom for many." So as someone has said: "Jesus died to pay a debt he did not owe, because we owed a debt we could not pay." As the old hymn puts it: "There was no other good enough to pay the price of sin, he only could unlock the gate of heaven and let us in."

Hold on to those 2 images look at the most famous Bible verse in the English-speaking world from John 3:16 "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son that whosoever believes in him shall not perish but have everlasting life."

The gift that Jesus died to purchase for us, the gift of forgiveness, freedom, and relationship with God now and for eternity – this gift - is something we have to receive, to take hold of by faith.

Even a little faith will make a great difference. For example, the tentative faith of the condemned criminal, hours from death, but aware that Jesus' death was very different to his own in Luke's Gospel (ch23: 39-43): "One of the criminals who were hanged railed at him, saying, "Are you not the Christ? Save yourself and us!" But the other rebuked him, saying, "Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation? And we indeed justly, for we are receiving the due reward of our deeds; but this man has done nothing wrong."

And he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." He only asks to be remembered, but Jesus says to him: "Truly, I say to you, today you will be with me in Paradise."

As we approach Easter, let me challenge you to receive with faith (however great or small) the reality of Jesus dying on the Cross for you. Join us for our Palm Sunday Procession to St Andrew's. Join us in St Andrew's on Easter Day. Come on Wednesdays for Healing Prayer or just coffee and cake.

He who once died for us is now risen, ascended and glorified, more alive than ever, and holding out friendship to us.
