



PARKING IN NATIONAL TRUST CAR PARKS

NT have changed their system so that all NT members must now display a ticket in their cars - the badge on the window isn't sufficient. This enables countryside properties to get £2 credit for members visiting, as the pay for entry NT properties do. So, if you are an NT member and using the car parks please do help Box Hill's funds by getting a ticket whenever you visit. To get a free ticket you will need to enter your NT membership number.

ACTION FRAUD ALERTS

Keyless Car Theft

They had a report of a suspect caller in Holmwood who was acting suspiciously in that he went to the door and did not knock but had his hand half in a soft looking pouch and a mobile phone /device in his other.

What is keyless car theft?

When keyless entry car fobs or cards are near the vehicle, they emit a signal that the car senses, unlocking the doors and allowing the engine to be started. If a car with keyless entry is parked in a driveway and the card or fob is inside the house, thieves can use relay devices to pick up the signal, amplify it and trick the car into unlocking the doors and allowing the engine to start.

How to avoid keyless car theft

- Make sure your car is properly locked and don't keep your keys near doors or windows. Keeping your car keys in a metal tin may help, or you can also buy signal blocking pouches.
- Use physical barriers such as a steering lock, a driveway parking post or a wheel clamp to discourage thieves.
- Check your manual or speak to your dealer to find out whether you can switch your key's signal off.
- Installing a car tracking device greatly increases the chance your vehicle will be recovered, if it is stolen.

The Best Ways to Keep Yourself Safe on the Streets

Below is a handy guide to preventing yourself from being targeted and, if you are, how to get your belongings returned to you.

- **Look confident:** Body language is key. If you look as if you know where you are walking with a purpose, you lower the chances of a robber targeting you.
- **Know where you're going**: Plan your route carefully, even considering street view. Look to stay on busy, well-lit streets, rather than narrow alleyways. A short cut isn't a short cut if you become a victim of crime. Only use licensed taxis booked over the phone or via a mobile app.

ACTION FRAUD ALERTS

The Best Ways to Keep Yourself Safe on the Streets (Continuation)

- Don't flaunt your gadgets: Walking around with your phone out, or wearing
 eye-catching headphones, increases the likelihood of being targeted by
 thieves so keep your valuables out of sight.
- Don't risk additional harm: If, in a rare situation, you are targeted remember that valuables can be replaced so don't risk physical harm for the sake of material goods.
- Log your IMEI number: Ensure you retain a record of your phone's IMEI number. This is a 15-digit unique number which can be obtained by keying in *#06#. You need this information if the phone is lost or stolen. And don't keep a note of it on your phone as this defeats the object.
- Keep your phone locked: Use your device's security features, apps or PIN locking mechanisms to protect your data and prevent the phone being used if stolen.
- **Immobilise it:** Register for free on an accredited mobile phone database such as Immobilise. Anyone can register their valued possessions or company assets. Registered items and ownership details are viewable on the Police national property database the NMPR. This helps police to identify you as the rightful owner and, nationally, it is used over 1,000 times a day. As a direct result of Immobilise there are hundreds of cases a week where property is or information. returned You can register on their website: https://www.immobilise.com/
- **Track your phone:** Consider installing a tracker app on your smartphone. They're readily available online. If your mobile's ever stolen, act promptly.
- Report suspicious activity: We would encourage you to report suspicious
 activity to us by calling 101 (always dial 999 in an emergency) or tell us online
 via https://www.surrey.police.uk/ro/report/. This helps us generate
 intelligence, build a picture of local activity, identify possible offenders and
 target preventative measures.





On arrival at Funchal Airport we were met by a lovely holiday representative and taken to the Cliff Bay Hotel for a two-night stay. A quick visit to the city market for a bit of R&R shopping! Then afternoon tea at Reid's Palace Hotel which is within walking distance of the Cliff Bay Hotel. Reid's is one of Madeira's iconic long-standing hotels and the tea was superb with waiter silver service.

On our second day we were able to go to do the iconic Toboggan Run. Great fun was had by all and we thoroughly recommend it. You can buy a photograph of yourselves zooming down the road at the end of the run, with the toboggans looking like oversized bread baskets!

Onwards for lunch at the Casa Velha Do Palheiro. This Casa is very quiet and tranquil being some 20 minutes from Funchal. Once a 19th Century Hunting Lodge, they also have an 18-hole golf course, and wonderful gardens with exotic trees and plants. Back to the Cliff Bay to collect our cases and on to the Quinta Jardins do Lago for our last night's stay and dinner.


Quinta Jardins Do Lago has breath taking views over the Bay of Funchal, and a lovely relaxing pool. There's also a resident giant tortoise called Columbo who's very partial to being fed by the



idyllic Cheshire village of her childhood. This story of village life is told with wit and humour.




The Cake Shop in the Garden by Carole Matthews

What Can We Take to the Dorking Tip?



After threats of closure, followed by protests and lobbying, the Dorking Tip will remain open for the time being while its future is reconsidered.

However, from 7 May 2019 onwards, only recyclable material will be accepted.

Recyclable items include: Domestic Batteries, Books, Car Batteries, Cardboard, Cartons, Cooking Oil, Electrical and Electronic Equipment (cookers, fridges and freezers, fluorescent tubes and lightbulbs, small domestic appliances, TV's and monitors, and washing machines), Foil, Food Tins and Drink Cans, Garden Waste, Gas Bottles, Metals, Mixed Glass, Bottles & Jars, Mixed Paper, Mobile Phones, Printer Cartridges, Spectacles, Tapes and Discs, Textiles, and Used Engine Oil.

Items no longer be accepted: Black Bag Waste, Carpets, Furniture, Hard Plastics, Hazardous Waste (Household and Garden Chemicals and Paint), Mattresses, Plastic Wrap and Film, and Wood and Timber.

Opening times: Monday to Thursday - closed

Friday - 8am to 4pm Weekends - 9am to 4pm

The centre is open as usual on Bank Holidays except Christmas Day, Boxing Day and New Year's Day when the centre is closed. The centre can close for up to 30 minutes during the day while full containers are being exchanged and waste compacted.

Vehicle restrictions: Vans, pick-ups and trailers will no longer be able to access this site

I would like to mention an article I read recently, especially as I see some dogs come to me with "issues", having been rescued from puppy farms and not so nice breeders.

Lucy was a Cavalier King Charles Spaniel. She was rescued from a Welsh puppy farm 5 years ago. Her hips had fused together, and she had a curved spine. She had bald patches and epilepsy, after years of mistreatment. She had been kept in a cage for most of her life and then, no longer able to have puppies, was ignored.

This dog went on to be re-homed and her story has helped to change the law. Lucy's owner campaigned to help other dogs like hers and in 2018 the government confirmed it would be banning the sales of third-party puppies and kittens. This decision was taken following public consultation from which there was over 95% support for the ban. It is said it will bring an end to the terrible welfare conditions found in puppy farming. This means if anyone is looking to buy or adopt a puppy or kitten under 6 months of age, they must deal directly with the breeder or animal rehoming centre. It is said it will help to crack down on puppy farms and make it much harder for high volume, low welfare breeders, both licensed and unlicensed, whose

trade relies on third party sellers.



As for Lucy: with a lot of love and patience, she went on to enjoy a full if not too short a life, for 3 years before she died in 2016.

It will not stop the illegal breeders, who will continue to do what they do and there will always be a market for these people, when the public get conned into buying these puppies/kittens. I am not sure how these people can be stopped, and consideration must be given to the breeding stock they already have. What will they do with those animals when they can no longer operate?

Everything has cause and effect and although Lucy's Law may save many dogs and in theory is an excellent idea, I cannot help but wonder, what will happen to the breeding dogs/cats that these people have now and the backstreet breeders who won't stop.

Au Naturel in the Back Garden

Forecasters were predicting a mini heatwave in parts of the UK over the Easter weekend with glorious sunshine and temperatures up to 25C, even hotter than traditional holiday destinations, including Majorca and parts of Egypt.



The unusually warm weather made the perfect setting for barbecues and beer gardens. So, those hoping for an all-over tan under the sun might have been tempted to strip off totally in the privacy of their own gardens. But you could find yourself in a spot of bother if you remove your clothing entirely.

While it is not against the law to be naked in public, it can become an offence if you cause alarm or distress to others and the Police have advised those who do wish to sunbathe naked to be discreet.

A spokesman for Avon and Somerset Police said the law was clear on being naked in public. The spokesman said: "Under the Sexual Offences Act 2003, it is not an offence for a person to appear naked in public, but it becomes an offence if it can be proved that the person stripped off with the intention to cause distress, alarm or outrage."

What's the advice?

The advice from the police is to let your neighbours know if you plan to sunbathe topless in your back garden to avoid any awkward situations.

Surrey Police shared a post about the issue after a row between neighbours in Reigate. The post read: "If you want to wander around your garden naked and you are overlooked by neighbours then you have to be careful - an Englishman's home is not quite his castle and your garden is not exempt from the law.

"In an ideal world, your relationship with your neighbours would be such that they would not object to you gardening in the buff and they would never dream of calling the police. "In the real world, however, you would be well advised to take some simple precautions," it added.

The police suggested sunbathing in one part of the garden that's screened from view. "You will have to decide whether your desire to be naked in your garden is more important to you than being on friendly terms with those around you," it said.




6 May 1840: The Penny Black revolutionises communications in Britain

Rowland Hill had a vision. While a small boy in Kidderminster, he had watched in embarrassment as his mother scrabbled for money to pay the postman. By the 1830s, Hill, then a teacher and social reformer, was determined to push through a change that he believed would transform the Post Office into a force for progress: universal penny postage, paid in advance rather than on receipt.

By May 1840, Hill's scheme was up and running. As he explained, people would prove that they had paid by using "a bit of paper just large enough to bear the stamp, and covered at the back with a glutinous wash which the sender might, by applying a little moisture, attach to the back of the letter". He enlisted the Royal Mint's chief engraver, Charles Heath, to create a memorable image — a picture of Queen Victoria, based on the 1834 cameo-like head by William Wyon, which was used on a medal to commemorate the Queen's visit to the City of London in 1837. Today we know his creation as the Penny Black.

The first stamps went on sale on 1st May 1840, and the system came into operation five days later. One schoolboy recalled that he did not "fancy making my mouth a glue pot," while the 'The Town' news sheet ran a saucy poem:

The Penny Black was an instant hit. Within a week the presses were working round the clock producing 600,000 stamps a day. The stamp had become an icon, a symbol of national pride: an image of Britannia itself. In February 1841, the Penny Black was replaced by the Penny Red.

Our current exhibition closes May 11th: There is a last chance to see 'Lord Ashcombe's Minerals – the gentlemen collectors and the advance of science', which showcases the history of and examples from Lord Ashcombe's stunning mineral collection. The collection has not been on regular display, so this is a rare opportunity to view selected examples of the quartz crystals he collected and displayed at Denbies in the 19th century.

The Days of King Dor, opens May 16th: Fancy yourself as a bit of a local history buff?

Perhaps you haven't heard of the West Holmwood Winged Basket (*detail pictured left*) or the ancient Dorking Chalk Egg? To see these and other frankly surprising artefacts from the distant and more recent past in this corner of Surrey, check out our new temporary exhibition and be prepared for a different version of history.

The Days of King Dor is a touring exhibition from the imaginary Leasingstede Museum, an idiosyncratic folk museum in the West country, the creation of artist Jane Williams. It is a display of the contents of an old wooden chest the Leasingstede curators found, full of things that shed light on the history of Dorking and the surrounding area. There is a fragment of a football — or is it a bit of

fossilized pancake? There is a metallic lozenge found on the Zig Zag road, and evidence of an extinct creature that used to roam the Pixham roundabout, long

before it was round, or even had tarmac. Be sure not to miss the coins from King Dor's reign and hear lots of tales as tall as Leith Hill tower.

Children's Activity, May 30th and 31st: To complement our new exhibition, and led by its creator, artist Jane Williams, the half-term activity is "What's in My Museum?", a drop-in event for 6-9-year-olds between 11am and 3.30pm. If you had your own museum, what would you choose to put on display? Costumes, armour, favourite toys, fossils or flowers? Or maybe it would be full of



creatures from outer space, or imaginary fish? Dinosaurs or cakes? Come along and have fun creating your museum in a shoe box, from a variety of craft materials.

Buckland Park Lake

Hidden Gem Opening to the Public in May 2019







Set within an Area of Great Landscape Value between Reigate and Dorking, the secret lake is known to very few, having been closed for years since the sand quarry stopped operations. As a result, nature has flourished undisturbed and the site now blends tranquillity with dramatic breathtaking views over one of Surrey's largest water bodies.

Since 2017, family owned Buckland Estate has been navigating planning permission to turn the beautiful landscape formed by sand quarrying from the 1920's to an attractive and useful outdoor activity resource for the local community and visitors from further afield. Planning permission was successfully secured in May 2018 and since then the Buckland Park Lake team has been busy putting into place the steps to achieve the approved plans.

These will include: a glass-fronted café with terrace, which will afford elevated views over the lake; a water sports activity centre, with toilet and shower facilities and indoor meeting space; and a children's trim trail and large sandpit.

Buckland Park Lake will host a series of ticketed family events in May ahead of its official opening next year.

The "taster" activities will increase awareness of this unique outdoor space and wildlife haven prior to its full opening to the public in the first half of 2020.

To date, the only way to access the site has been via membership of the established fly-fishing club or the resident water sports provider, The Surrey Hills Adventure Company, which offers open water swimming and other activities by appointment.

Although the site is not due to be complete until summer 2020, Buckland Park Lake will open up a major part of the site - comprising the lagoon, meadow and events lawn - this year for several private, ticketed events, initially offering a family-focused event during the May half term, running from May 25-June 2.

Activities to include: ancient woodland trail, build a mini-raft station, welly boot planting station, giant sandpit and toys, space hoppers, hula hoops and garden games, inflatables, face painting, storytelling in a marquee for younger children, refreshments (including hot food, tea, coffee and sweet treats), open-water swimming (additional cost), stand-up paddle boarding (additional cost), and bush craft (additional cost)

Dominic Sanders of Buckland Estate said: "We hope people will be keen to come and see what's behind our gates, that have been effectively locked for the past 50 years. This year we are very much a work in progress, but we hope people will forgive us this, in return for a sneak-peak at our beautiful space. If this event proves successful, we would love to hold summer, Halloween and Christmas themed events this year as well."

Dominic continued: "The resident flora and fauna are of huge importance to us. It's the reason we will be limiting our daily ticket sales and also doing our best to limit single use plastics and non-sustainable packaging. We have tried to base all our activities around the outdoors, providing fun nature-based activities for the children. Sustainability and treading lightly on our space are a big part of our ethos."





Box Hill Procession (Continuation)


Why was there a triumphal procession in Box Hill on Palm Sunday?

On the first Palm Sunday in Israel, many had gathered for a festival in Jerusalem. News spread that Jesus was coming into the city. He rode on a young donkey. People came out and took palm branches to follow him, shouting, 'Hosanna!' and 'Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!' and 'Blessed is the King of Israel!' They thought of Jesus as the military powerhouse, who would rid the Jews of their hated Roman conquerors and restore them to greatness.

But hang on. There is something not quite right here. In those times Kings did not enter their capital city riding on a donkey! Kings and conquering generals would ride a splendid chariot surrounded by his troops, dressed up to the nines and accompanied by conquered slaves in chains and rags. So, what is going on here on the first Palm Sunday?

The Messiah, the saviour of Israel, Jesus the Son of God is making it very clear he is not like earthly kings and conquerors. He is challenging the preconceptions of the first century Jews - and ours too. He is the Son of God, yet a humble person, a king come to serve, whose kingdom is not of this world. We know that within a week – that we call Holy Week- the same crowd would be shouting 'Crucify him'.

Letter from the Rector

St Paul writes to Christians in Ephesus "be strong in the Lord and in his mighty power. Put on the full armour of God, so that you can take your stand against the devil's schemes." He wants us to be equipped.

Paul was writing the letter to the Ephesians whilst under house arrest in Rome, chained to a Roman soldier... so he is quite probably describing his own guard as he gives the members of the Church in Ephesus very practical advice.

On our 1st Sundays we are looking at the Armour of God and in February we looked at the first piece of the soldier's equipment – "the belt of truth buckled around your waist." We thought about rejoicing in the truth, valuing the truth, and the Truth setting us free.

In March we looked at the breastplate, "the breastplate of righteousness" that we need to have in place: The breastplate that protects our vital organs and especially the heart. We thought about living a way of life that is a right way of life as in Psalm 23:3 where the Good Shepherd "leads me in the paths of righteousness."

But righteousness is also about our standing before God and Jesus' death on the Cross for us was not only a great example of love, no, it was a transaction.

We see in 1 Peter 3:18 "For Christ also died for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, that he might bring us to God." And in 2 Corinthians 5:21 "For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God."

We are offered an exchange by Jesus... he takes our unrighteousness and gives us his righteousness. All we have to do is say "Yes Please."

All this is very good news – and good news needs sharing widely – which is why we looked in April at having our "feet fitted with the readiness that comes from the gospel of peace." St Paul would have us get ready like a sprinter on the blocks... he wants us like a batsman to be on the front foot... people need to know they can have peace with Heaven – it really matters.

The prophet Isaiah wrote: "How beautiful upon the mountains are the feet of those who bring good news, who publish peace, who bring good news of happiness, who publish salvation." If you know the good news, please don't keep it to yourself, tell someone else. If you would like to know it – do come along and find out more.




