



The Good Neighbours team offer essential services to the elderly and disabled on the hill where volunteer drivers take residents to hospital, doctor and optician appointments. In the last year they have completed 535 journeys by 10 volunteer drivers. They have travelled as far as Guildford, East Grinstead and London.

They normally operate Monday to Friday unless there is a real emergency. The cost to residents is 50p per mile, 45p of which is given to the driver. They are affiliated to Surrey Community Action who support and advise them and many other schemes in Surrey, some also called Good Neighbours.

Why is the sky blue?



The sky appears blue to the human eye as the short waves of blue light are scattered more than the other colours in the spectrum, making the blue light more visible.

To understand why the sky is blue, we first need to understand a little bit about light. Although light from the sun looks white it is really made up of a spectrum of many different colours, as we can see when they are spread out in a rainbow.

We can think of light as being a wave of energy, and different colours all have a different wavelength. At one end of the spectrum is red light which has the longest wavelength and at the other is blue and violet lights which have a much shorter wavelength.

So why is the sky blue?

When the sun's light reaches the Earth's atmosphere it is scattered, or deflected, by the tiny molecules of gas (mostly nitrogen and oxygen) in the air. Because these molecules are much smaller than the wavelength of visible light, the amount of scattering depends on the wavelength. This effect is called Rayleigh scattering, named after Lord Rayleigh who first discovered it.

Shorter wavelengths (violet and blue) are scattered the most strongly, so more of the blue light is scattered towards our eyes than the other colours. You might wonder why the sky doesn't actually look purple since violet light is scattered even more strongly than blue. This is because there isn't as much violet in sunlight to start with, and our eyes are much more sensitive to blue.

The blue light that gives the sky its colour, is sufficiently bright to make all the stars that we see at night disappear since the light they emit is much dimmer.

Why does the blue fade towards the horizon?

You might also notice that the sky tends to be most vibrant overhead and fades to pale as it reaches the horizon; this is because the light from the horizon has had further to travel through the air and so has been scattered and re-scattered. The Earth's surface also plays a role scattering and reflecting this light. As a result of this increased amount of scattering, the dominance of blue light is decreased and so we see an increased amount of white light.



Update from David Preedy

Mole Valley District Councillor for Box Hill & Headley

The two months since the May's election have been quite a busy period both for the District Council and for our two communities.

At a personal level I have been appointed to several roles on the new Council. The most significant is as Chair of the Development

Management Committee which meets each month to decide on the larger planning applications. I am also a member of the Scrutiny and Audit committees and of several Working Groups. Like most councillors, I will be the Council's nominee on a few outside organisations — in my case the Central Surrey Council for Voluntary Service, the Gatwick Joint Local Authorities Group, the Lower Mole Partnership Steering Group & the Norbury Park Liaison Group — and a substitute member of the Surrey Hills AoNB Board.

However, above all I am your ward councillor so please get in touch with any issues of concern; my contact details are at the end of this update.

Yellow Lines on Boxhill Road: Now that the yellow lines on Boxhill Road are (largely) in place, several residents have been in touch. The scheme was agreed based on local consultations and meetings and it was agreed to go ahead with the scheme that attracted most support. Perhaps unsurprisingly initial reactions on their impact are mixed. The first opportunity to review the impact will be at the end of August, so please tell me and Hazel Watson about your experiences.

Bin Collections: Several local residents have had problems with bin collections, either missed collections or emptied bins left blocking drives or pavements. I reported an incident when a bin was left blocking the pavement from Upper Farm, making it impassable for mobility scooters. These are teething problems across Mole Valley with the new contractor who took over the waste collection a few months ago. If your bin collection is missed, please contact Mole Valley on 01306 885001 and give them the details; but please also let me know so I can understand whether the situation is improving.

Mole Valley Local Plan: The new administration at Pippbrook decided to postpone the consultation on the new Local Plan to allow time to see whether the housing target can be reduced to enable greater protection for the Green Belt. As a result, the formal consultation has been delayed until later in the year rather than being held over the Summer.

Update from Cllr. David Preedy (Continuation)

Mole Valley District Council: Two initiatives were approved at a special Council meeting in June. The first is to revert to a Committee-run system from May 2020. At present most decisions are made by a handful of Councillors in the Cabinet and sometimes the public Cabinet meeting has done little more than rubber-stamp decisions made earlier. Changing back to a Committee-run system will engage all Councillors in making key Council decisions and should ensure greater transparency as the full discussion around decisions will be held in public.

MVDC Climate Emergency Initiative: The second initiative is the announcement of a Climate Emergency and the Council's intent to be carbonneutral by 2030. This commitment will affect all aspects of the Council's operations. Please let me know if you have ideas how the Council, or we as residents, can do our bit to tackle this global challenge.

Headley Court: The new owners of Headley Court ran a consultation afternoon at the start of July, which many local people attended. The existing housing in Dale View and Cunliffe Close has already been put on the market and outline plans were shown for how the rest of the site might be developed, mainly for new housing. The owners are talking to other interested parties about possible uses of the listed house and the area immediately around it.

SES Water and Road Closures: SES Water have unveiled their plans to complete the water main renewal in Headley. The existing closure of Tot Hill will continue till September and they expect to close Church Lane from January to April 2020 and Headley Common Road from April to September 2020. They will then work from the Boxhill Road junction to Pfizer, but this stage can be done using traffic light controls. This will be disruptive including to the bus service and we are working on plans to minimise this. SES are planning a programme of communications over the Autumn and I will ensure Box Hill residents are kept informed.

In conclusion: I hope all residents will feel free to get in contact if you need my help or there is anything you wish to discuss. My contact details will be included in each edition of Box Hill News if you ever need them.

DOG GROOMING DAYS

Caring for Your Dog in Hot Weather

The British Veterinary Association has teamed up with a coalition of rescue and re-homing charities, police

and welfare organisations to launch this year's 'Dogs die in hot cars' campaign. I know I mention this a lot, but if pet owners stopped thinking "it won't happen to my pet", then maybe we would not keep hearing of dogs getting distressed and losing their lives.

Despite a major campaign every summer, 2018 recorded a three year high of dogs suffering from heat exhaustion. Also, the RSPCA received 8,290 reports of emergencies due to overheated dogs.



The RSPCA are not the people to ring first, as they need to find someone to get to the area and then obtain power of entry from the police. So, if you see a

dog in a car showing signs of distress due to heat or humidity, dial 999 because police officers can attend more quickly and have the power to enter vehicles. Many people's instinct is to break into the vehicle without proper justification and therefore this could be classed as criminal damage, so make sure you have informed the police of your intentions. If the police cannot get there quickly and the situation appears critical, take photos or video, or get someone else to do this, and obtain names and telephone numbers of witnesses (most animal loving people will oblige). The law states that you have a lawful reason to commit damage if you believe the owner of the property that you damage would consent to the damage if they were confronted with these circumstances, so proof is really needed. All this takes time; meanwhile the dog is probably getting more distressed, so all of this needs to be done quickly.

Once the dog has been removed from the car (and make sure the dog cannot run off once recovered), take the dog to a shaded/cool area and douse with tepid water. Never use cold water as this will prevent their core body temperature going down and the dog may go into shock. If the owner has not returned, get the dog to a vet as soon as possible.

DOG GROOMING DAYS (Continuation)

When the temperature outside is, let's say 26c/78f, a car parked in the shade with the windows open can reach 32c/90f degrees in 5 minutes and in 25 minutes 43c/110f.

To reduce the risk of heat stroke, restrict exercise, never leave in a car, hot room, confined space or sun traps. Use cool towels soaked in tepid water not cold. Place in breeze of a fan. There are cool coats and mats available. Walk in the coolest part of the day, usually early mornings and never walk on hot pavements, tarmac etc. Remember if you cannot hold the palm of your hand on the ground for a minute, then it's too hot for your dog to walk on.

Despite all of this, it is surprising how many dogs I see walking on Box Hill during the day. A humid day, with grey skies can still cause a dog to overheat and die.

Signs of an over-heated dog: heavy panting, tongue hanging out of mouth by some distance, difficulty in breathing, severe salivating, vomiting, diarrhoea, raised temperature, blood in urine, nosebleed or other bleeding problems. If you spot any of these symptoms during a heatwave or humid conditions, please get your dog to a vet immediately. What will follow is collapse, coma and death.

It saddens me greatly of hearing dogs dying and in so many cases the owners say they did not realise. With all the information out there and I would like to think common sense would prevail - ignorance is no excuse.



Exhibitions

'The Days of King Dor - a touring exhibition from Leasingstede Museum': Our current rather unusual exhibition remains open until September 21st. It is the creation of artist Jane Williams and is a display of artefacts from Dorking's past, but not a past that any local historians would recognise.

Without revealing all the surprises, one object on show in The Days of King Dor is a small chalk carving, which looks like an egg with a fin. Jane explains, "The very first Dorking hens didn't have space in their eggs for the fifth toe, so for many generations



there was this streamlined ridge running the length of the egg." Surrey's poulterers probably have a different view.

Another artefact is a well-worn, faded purple leather drawstring bag, with a few wooden counters with letters on them. "This is an example of a game, which was all the rage in the parlours of Victorian Dorking," says Jane. "It's called the Deepdene Dip." (pictured left)

What about King Dor himself? "He lived

nearby in the Dark Ages, had some coins minted and the only ones remaining are in the exhibition ... and he was keen on swimming", is all that Jane will reveal.

'Those who came before us': The Museum's next exhibition, opening on September 26th, is presented in conjunction with art psychotherapist Sophia Cowx. It explores Dorking's response to refugee crises in the past, the emergence of the poppy symbol as a creative response to the trauma of war, and the poppy's connections with healing for centuries.

Headley Court Consultation in July 2019

Angle Property (*Angle*), a Buckinghamshire based development company focused on delivering high quality schemes in London and the South East, completed the purchase of the former Headley Court rehabilitation centre in May 2019, following closure of the rehabilitation centre in September 2018.



Angle are in the early days of considering options for the land and buildings acquired by them. An initial consultation event was held on 4th July 2019 so that residents could learn more about the early Master Planning ideas and meet the team. A further event will be held in autumn 2019.

The Headley Court site covers approximately 82 Acres (33 Hectares). There is 300,000 sq ft (equivalent of nearly 5 football pitches) of floor space across all the buildings on site. There is also in excess of 450 car parking spaces on site. *Angle* are preparing a Master Plan and have divided the site into 3 elements as indicated below. The Master Plan will also consider linkages through the site including possible footpaths.

Element 1: includes the existing 64 properties on Cunliffe Close and Dale View, the play area and woodland.

This element no longer forms part of the site or the redevelopment proposals because it has been sold to Clerkenwell Estate who is marketing these properties for private sale.

Headley Court Consultation in July 2019 (Continuation)

Element 2: includes the manor house, gardens and the Help for Heroes building. This is a very sensitive and complex part of the site. *Angle* are currently exploring options for the viable future use of the manor, grounds and additional buildings, and will be commercially marketed over summer 2019. Ideally, a single-phase development will be found which respects and incorporates all the listed assets on the site. Potential uses for this element could include, residential, a hotel, a care home or school.

Further ideas and feedback on the marketing of this part of the site will be available at an additional consultation event in autumn 2019.

Element 3: includes the land and buildings to the west of Headley Road as well as the temporary buildings to the east of Headley Road.



This element covers about 20 acres (8 Hectares) and *Angle* consider this part of the site appropriate for residential development. *Angle* are proposing that the existing buildings are demolished and replaced by a residential development which is predominantly a housing led scheme.



Angle understand the importance of ensuring that this quality development fits in well locally and will spend considerable time working with the Mole Valley District Council on developing proposals for this part of the site. The consultation event later in the autumn will provide further details.



Angle are of the view that the number of potential new homes could be in the region of 250. This level of housing will maintain the existing current level of floor space across the site. This figure will also contain an element of Affordable Housing.

Headley Court Consultation in July 2019 (Continuation)

Angle envisage that the mixture of private and affordable homes will be in a range of sizes and styles. Properties will range from two bedroom to four bedrooms. Parking levels on the new development will be in accordance with Mole Valley District Council Planning policy. So, a development of 250 new homes, (1/3 one/two bed

properties, 2/3 three/four bed properties), would result in a recommended car parking provision of approximately 438 spaces.

Angle have considered the previous traffic movements associated with the existing MoD Medical Rehabilitation Centre which includes a fully audited traffic survey from 2016 when the existing facility was occupied and operational. They have also analysed and calculated the traffic movements predicted for a residential development of 250 new homes. Peak times movements compare as follows:

Occupancy / Traffic Movements	8am - 9am	5pm – 6pm
MoD Rehabilitation Centre (2016 Survey)	112	79
250 Dwelling Residential Development **	116	107

Angle will be organising a second consultation event in the autumn, prior to the submission of a planning application early in 2020.

Computer User's Corner

The End is Nigh - well for Windows 7

On 14th January 2020 Microsoft will officially end extended support of Windows 7. Yes, in less than 6 months Windows 7 will not receive any software support or updates.



But what does this actually mean for you?

In very simple terms it means that your Windows 7 device will become less and less useful if you use the device for any internet connected activity. For example, if you use the machine for online banking, your bank will stop you gaining access to your online accounts, as they view your computer as being a security risk to their systems. Bit by bit this will become widespread and most online shopping systems will block your ability to carry out transactions with them for the same reason.

We are not saying your machine will suddenly stop working on the 14th January. Your files and photos will still be accessible, the machine will power on as before, but you will be at greater risk to security breaches, and your ability to communicate and collaborate with others will be much reduced.

What can you do about this?

 Upgrade the software on your machine to Windows 10 (the World's most used operating system). This does carry a cost of £130 for the software alone, and your machine may not be designed to work efficiently with Windows 10

Or

2) Replace your computer with a new Windows 10 machine. 


More Than Just a Good Life.

But Rosie is not prepared to give up without a fight. The author is a first time read for me and I shall look out for her other books.

I had wanted to travel to Japan for a long time, and in March I was very fortunate to have the opportunity to spend two weeks in this fascinating country.

There are several ways to see Japan, a fully escorted group tour, a cruise, independent travel and a self-guided tour. We decided on the last option. The tour operator pre-booked international flights, accommodation, Japan Rail Pass and excursions were arranged locally for us with an English-speaking government appointed guide. You are then able to travel and explore at your own pace, around the pre-booked excursions.

We started in Tokyo, staying in Asakusa, an older part of the city and home to the Senso-ji Buddhist temple. It was very easy to travel on the subway and other local transport, with English signs at all the stations. A journey in the rush hour is an experience, the Tokyo metropolis being home to over 13 million people! We found the people everywhere to be unfailingly polite, friendly and very helpful. There is no litter – anywhere. The Shinkansen (bullet trains) run like clockwork and are very comfortable. The guards, who look more like airline pilots, bow as they enter and leave the carriage! The main stations are destinations in themselves with many restaurants, shops, including impressive department stores.

Japan still has a reputation for being expensive, but there are many mid-priced restaurants where you can eat good quality food (one course and a drink for about £10-£15), so we were pleasantly surprised. You can, of course, pay much more if you so wish. There are more Michelin starred restaurants in Tokyo than any other city in the world. In addition, the Japanese love to shop for high end consumer goods.



The markets were great value and the street food, particularly in Osaka was very affordable. The food is certainly different – be adventurous and make sure your chop stick skills are honed! Some of the restaurants have Teppanyaki tables with hot plates where you cook your own food, a great experience and good fun.

The day trip to Mount Fuji was a highlight. It was a clear day and Fuji can be notoriously shy (often covered in cloud), so we were very lucky to have a fabulous view of the perfect conical shape, still snow-capped from winter.

The other cities visited were Kanazawa, Nagoya, Kyoto and Osaka, travelling to each one by bullet train. From Nagoya we visited Nara, where hundreds of deer roam freely around the town (we weren't expecting them to be all over the pavements)! My map got taken out of my pocket and eaten – but how can you be cross with Bambi!

We also took a day trip to Hiroshima to see the A-Bomb Dome (left) and Peace Memorial Park, which needs no explanation. The park is a symbol of peace, created in 1949 after the Pacific War ended.

Near to Hiroshima is beautiful Miyajima. Take the ferry from the port and head over to the island, home to the Itsukushima Shrine (a UNESCO World Heritage site) and

one of the three most beautiful sights in Japan. The floating 'torii' gate (below) at the entrance to the shrine is very photogenic, and this was one of my favourite sights.



So, if you would like to see Shinto Shrines alongside Buddhist Temples, learn about the Shogun Dynasty, visit imposing but very attractive castles, go high-tech in Akihabara, go traditional in Gion (Kyoto's Geisha district with traditional tea houses), have a drink in a cat or maid café (yes really), see the revered Cherry Blossom and experience a new food culture – then plan a trip to Japan. I would love to help you, so please do give me a call ...



Letter from the Rector

Maybe you have had a break this summer, or you are having a holiday at home? The 'Feeding of the 5000' always makes me think about holidays. Either way I hope you feel a little refreshed.

Right Understanding

In Mark 6 we read: "32 So



they went away by themselves in a boat to a solitary place. ³³ But many who saw them leaving recognized

them and ran on foot from all the towns and got there ahead of them. ³⁴ When Jesus landed and saw a large crowd, he had compassion on them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd. So, he began teaching them many things."

Right understanding is vital to our ability to engage with God and live his way in the world. But towards the end of the day the people needed to eat. What Jesus does next is glorious, but the disciples do not seem to be thinking his way. They say ³⁵ "This is a remote place," they said, "and it's already very late. ³⁶ Send the people away so that they can go to the surrounding countryside and villages and buy themselves something to eat." ³⁷ But he answered, "You give them something to eat." They said to him, "That would take almost a year's wages! Are we to go and spend that much on bread and give it to them to eat?"

You can hear their shock, indignation and disbelief – even though this is Jesus talking to them! But Jesus is a calm teacher, unruffled by their response. ³⁸ "How many loaves do you have?" he asked. "Go and see." When they found out, they said, "Five – and two fish." There is no special significance to the number, it is just a fact... but there were 5000 men, not counting women and children, who needed feeding.

"³⁹ Then Jesus directed them to have all the people sit down in groups on the green grass. ⁴⁰ So they sat down in groups of hundreds and fifties. ⁴¹ Taking the five loaves and the two fish and looking up to heaven, he gave thanks and broke the loaves. Then he gave them to his disciples to set before the people."

It might be you were told in the past that this never really happened, there was no miracle, but people were in fact shamed into generosity and sharing their picnics. But the Gospel authors clearly say (in all 4 Gospels) that this miracle happened – it was one of the things that marked Jesus out – a demonstration of the Kingdom of God.

So, what do you think was going on? Was Jesus supernaturally multiplying this simple meal and the disciples running back and forth as waiters? Or did something else happen? As I read it the multiplication took place in their hands and there was a basket for each of them left at the end.

What might God want to be doing through you and me this term? Will we trust him also to provide for us?


