Update from David Preedy

Mole Valley District Councillor for Box Hill & Headley

At the time of writing, the Council is, like much of the rest of the country, getting back into swing after the Summer break. There is however a big question-mark over the timing of what may happen over the next few months — namely the timing of a General Election which now looks inevitable before too long. During a General

Election campaign, the Council goes officially into "purdah" and is not allowed to engage in new initiatives which might be viewed as political; this includes launching new consultations.

Local Plan

As a result, the planned consultation on the new Local Plan, which was scheduled to start on October 21st, has been delayed. Whenever this goes ahead, it is a really important topic which will not just outline where new housing is likely to be built to meet the Government's housing target for Mole Valley, but also set local policies for the priorities to be given to different sorts of development. I hope as many residents as possible will take the time to look at the proposals and give the Council your views on them.

Waste Collection

The new waste collection arrangements remain unreliable with continuing occasional reports of missed collections; if your bin is not collected on the designated day, please report it as soon as possible to Mole Valley who should arrange an alternative collection; but please let me know as well as we are trying to monitor the problems with the new waste collection contractors.

Highways

Headley Road Closures: At long last, Tot Hill/Leech Lane in Headley has been reopened. The work there has taken much longer than was originally scheduled and this does not bode well for the plans for further work next year. I am in touch with the SES Water project team and I have already asked them to revise their plans for the work along Church Lane (due between January & April 2020) and Headley Common Road (May-Sept 2020) to reduce the impact on residents. They are currently using ground-penetrating radar to confirm exactly where all the utility services are under-ground and we plan to meet up once that is known. Both these phases affect the bus route on which many residents depend.

Highways (Continuation)

Pebble Hill Junction: I am in touch with the County Councillor for Tadworth, Walton & Kingswood and we are planning to meet up to discuss options for the Headley Common Road/Dorking Road/Pebble Hill Road junction. At present there is no money allocated to improve this, but I want to see if we can agree what sort of scheme ought to be considered so it can be activated more quickly when funds do become available.

Yellow Lines along Boxhill Road: Thanks to all the residents who have given both me and Hazel Watson feedback about the impact of the yellow lines on Boxhill Road; these will be fed into the review to be undertaken by Highways Officers. Any alternative recommendations will be discussed with the Neighbourhood Council to ensure that the consensus residents' views are taken into account.

Matters Arising

I hope all residents will feel free to get in contact if you need my help or there is anything you wish to discuss.

DOG GROOMING DAYS

Stray dog with micro-chip but no ID Tag

In August, a stray dog was brought into us that had wandered into the local pub. No collar, so no ID tag,

which in itself is breaking the law, but anyway.... My assistant, Becky, has a scanner for micro-chips, so she popped home to get it and then scanned the dog.



Although the chip was not where it should be, suggesting it had moved, Becky found it and scanned for the number. All good so far. She rang **Pet Log** and after pressing several numbers finally got through to a human. Becky explained the situation and told them we had the micro-chip number. We were asked for a pin number which we do not have and were then told by **Pet Log** that because of data protection, they could not give us any information regarding the owner.

Now, we did not expect them to give us any information, after all we could be just anyone, but we did think that if we gave *Pet Log* the chip number, then they would sort out the missing dog, but apparently not. They told us to contact the police or dog warden. If this had been a weekend (and this may have changed), dog wardens do not work Saturday or Sunday and the police (again this may have changed) would take the dog, but take it to a kennels for stray dogs and nothing would be done until the Monday. I read some time ago of a stray dog being taken to kennels and forgotten. Not locally but somewhere in England this happened, and the dog starved to death.

Thankfully this was a Monday, so the Mole Valley Dog Warden was contacted. We explained and she said to leave it with her. A short while later, the owner turned up and owner and pet were reunited. Huge relief.

We contacted the Dog Warden again to save her looking into this, but got someone different on the switchboard, who told my assistant the Dog Warden was on holiday! Having said we had spoken to one not that long ago, she tried to contact that section but to no avail, so sent an email instead. Meanwhile, the Dog Warden, having not got the email, got back to us to say that she had the same trouble as we did with Pet Log, so 1) what's the point of Pet Log if it does not reunite pet with owner when given the microchip number, and 2) how many dogs do not get reunited quickly because of all this red tape.

Of course, all of this could have been sorted quickly if the dog had an ID tag on. For those pet owners who think just having a micro-chip will suffice, let me explain: **The Control of Dogs Order 1982** states any dog in a public place should have a collar/harness with an ID tag attached. The ID tag should have name, address including post code, telephone number (optional). Personally, I would not have name and

address on, but a telephone number for quickness to contact. Some pet owners also put their vet's number on as well. You can be fined up to £5000 for failure to have an ID tag, should the police decide to enforce this, and they can.

Computer User's Corner

So, what is Wi-Fi and what does it do?

Wi-Fi is the name of a wireless networking technology that uses radio waves to provide high-speed network and Internet connections.



The Wi-Fi Alliance, the organization that owns the Wi-Fi (registered trademark) term specifically defines Wi-Fi as "wireless local area network (WLAN) products that are based on the Institute of Electrical and

Electronics Engineers' (IEEE) 802.11 standards."

Initially, Wi-Fi was used in place of only the 2.4GHz 802.11b standard, but the Wi-Fi Alliance has expanded the generic use of the Wi-Fi term to include any type of network or WLAN product based on any of the 802.11 standards.

How Does Wi-Fi Technology Work?

Wi-Fi works with no physical wired connection between sender and receiver by using radio frequency (RF) technology, a frequency within the electromagnetic spectrum associated with radio wave propagation. When an RF current is supplied to an antenna, an electromagnetic field is created that then is able to propagate through space.

The cornerstone of any wireless network is an access point (AP). The primary job of an access point is to broadcast a wireless signal that computers can detect and "tune" into. In order to connect to an access point and join a wireless network, computers and devices must be equipped with wireless network adapters.

What does Wi-Fi mean?

A common misconception is that the term Wi-Fi is short for "wireless fidelity." This is not the case. Wi-Fi is simply a trademarked term meaning IEEE 802.11x. The false notion that the brand name "Wi-Fi" is short for "wireless fidelity" has spread to such an extent that even industry leaders have included the phrase wireless fidelity in a press release. You'll also find references to Wi-Fi being short for wireless fidelity on a number of well-known and respected technology-focused publications and websites. The truth is, Wi-Fi isn't short for anything — and it never was.

In fact, Phil Belanger, a founding member of the Wi-Fi Alliance who presided over the selection of the name "Wi-Fi", has stated that the brand-consulting firm *Interbrand* invented Wi-Fi as a pun on the word hi-fi (high fidelity), a term for high-quality audio technology.

The Blue Idol Quaker Meeting House dates from 1580 when it was built as a farmhouse. In 1691, William Penn and other Friends in the area bought the building and converted it into a permanent Quaker Meeting House. It has had a number of names including: 'Little Slatters' (the original name), Shipley Preparative Meeting, and Thakenham Preparative Meeting. The Blue Idol name is possibly because it was once painted with a

blue wash and was left empty or "idle" from 1793 - 1869.

The Blue Idol is on the West Sussex Literary Trail. The main building and the hovel barn (which houses an exhibition on William Penn and Quakers), are both Grade 2 listed buildings. November 2019 marks 100 years of 'Remembering' those who gave their lives in the Great War (1914-18) and subsequent conflicts. In recognition of this year's Remembrance Sunday (10th November), we have selected three books with a wartime theme.

First Lady. The Life and Wars of Clementine Churchill by Sonia Purnell



I found this an excellent biography and can only repeat some of the notes on the book cover. Without Winston Churchill's inspiring leadership Britain could not have survived its darkest hour. Without his wife Clementine, however, he might never have become Prime Minister. By his own admission, his role in the Second World War would have been impossible but for 'Clemmie'. That Clementine should have become Britain's 'First Lady' was by no means preordained. She may have been born an aristocrat, but her childhood was far from gilded. From the

personal and political upheavals of the Great War through the Churchills' 'wilderness years' in the 1930's, to Clementine's desperate efforts to sustain Winston during the struggle against Hitler, First Lady seeks to recover the memory of one of the most remarkable women of modem times.



Women at the Ready. The Remarkable Story of the Women's Voluntary Services on the Home Front



"The greatest disservice a woman can do is consider herself useless." The words of Lady Reading founder of the Women's Voluntary Services struck a mighty chord among Britain's women. From the summer of 1938, with war on the horizon, British women from all walks of life joined the WVS to help serve and protect their communities. By 1941 a million women had

enrolled. There are many references to Surrey, some funny and some heartrending. I found this book most interesting and not at all a dry history book.

The Chilbury Ladies' Choir by Jennifer Ryan

Kent 1940. In the idyllic village of Chilbury change is afoot. Hearts are breaking as sons and husbands leave to fight and when the Vicar decides to close the choir until the men return, all seems lost. But coming together in song is just what the women need, and they are ready to sing. Uplifting and profoundly moving the book explores how a village can endure the onslaught of war and how survival is as much about friendship as it is about courage. I really recommend this book.

Nick provided a link to their fundraising website, but for those without access to the internet, here is a what it says:




The adventurers, Theo & Oskar

We're Theo (7) and Oskar (5), and we have Duchenne muscular dystrophy. It's a stinker of a disease. It means we can't produce dystrophin, the protein all our muscles need. As a result, we're getting weaker, and fast. Things which our friends can do, we can't, and this makes us sad.

We won't be able to walk soon, but don't want to let

this stop us doing the things we want to. We're adventurers and love exploring the big outdoors, going to the places our friends go -- up hills, across fields, down dirt tracks, along beaches. But we need special wheelchairs, ones with big wheels and motors, to be able to go to these places. Like the one pictured below, which one of us test-rode the other day -- it was awesome! We're buying them second-hand, but they're not cheap, about £10,000 each, and we've only raised half of this so far. So please help us raise the rest.

In June 2019, my husband and I visited Germany. On arrival at Berlin Tegel Airport, we were transferred the short distance to the four-star Maritim Hotel in Berlin, ideally located near the famous Potsdamer Platz in the heart of the city.

The following morning, we engaged on a city tour taking in many of the city's famous landmarks. including Checkpoint Charlie, a symbol of the cold war when Berlin was divided between East and West. The tour covered both sections including the Brandenburg Gate and the historic Unter den Linden. The afternoon was free, so we took the opportunity to visit the Reichstag (parliament) building - one needed to book in advance as queues were very long for the same day visit. The Dome area has amazing views over the city and I highly recommend the visit. For another fine view of Berlin, you can prebook the revolving restaurant at the top of the Berlin TV Tower.

Saying a sad farewell to Berlin the following day we travelled to Dresden, making a detour in order to visit Colditz Castle, the infamous Second World War prison where our guide offered such interesting insight into the day to day running and lives of the prisoners held there during that period. On display are the escape tunnels, false uniforms and other escape equipment all crafted from whatever the prisoners could lay their hands on.

A short journey on from Colditz, we arrived at the famous Meissen porcelain studio. where it was explained how individual creations are handcrafted using centuries-old techniques. We also had time to explore all the stunning artefacts on display. Finally, after a long day travelling, we arrived for our two-night stay in Dresden on the river Elbe. This city dates back as far as the 12th Century, and although the majority of magnificent buildings were destroyed by the allied bombing in 1945 most of it has been rebuilt to its former glory. It's a beautiful city to stroll through with Baroque, Renaissance many Classical buildings to behold. Within its cobbled streets there are delightful shops and quaint restaurants to stop and have a coffee break or a quick snack whilst listening to the many talented street musicians. Dresden is an easy walkable city in which to explore. Our last evening was spent in a cosy restaurant enjoying fine wine and a superb meal made from local produce All in all, two very interesting cities and definitely worth a visit.





Letter from the Rector

"What is it like being a Christian?" someone may ask. It is the very best thing I would say.


"Is it easy or difficult?" they ask. Sometimes it is hard I say. And in some parts of the world it is incredibly hard.

But nothing that I am asked to do by God is as hard as the immense and awesome mission Jesus undertook for me.

Jesus left all the glory of Heaven and came to earth to die on Calvary. Jesus carried all the sin and shame of the world (including mine and yours) as he hung on that cross. It meant he was separated from the Father. He paid a price for us — a price we could never pay — for our forgiveness and freedom and life.

But he tells people in the crowds who are following him to think hard and to use an old phrase – to count the cost of discipleship. Jesus said: 'If anyone comes to me and does not hate father and mother, wife and children, brothers and sisters – yes, even their own life – such a person cannot be my disciple. And whoever does not carry their cross and follow me cannot be my disciple.

John Piper writes: Now, this is extreme language. The most extreme that he could use, I think, to show that the degree of the cost we may have to pay is extreme. The first extreme language is "I am calling you to something that is going to look like hatred of wife and children and parents." And the second extreme language is "I am calling you to get on a cross," which means a willingness to die an excruciating death.




We do not like this subject I am sure but not all that long ago in Europe Christians were put to death for their faith by the Nazis. Dietrich Bonhoeffer (author of The Cost of Discipleship) was imprisoned and executed for being theologian and member of the Confessing Church. Members of Corrie Ten Boom's family were sent to Death Camps for sheltering Jews.

They were not alone. More recently many Christians in Muslim majority nations have been killed – several very publicly by the so-called Islamic State.

None of us would choose such an outcome for ourselves, of course not, but is our Christianity, is our faith, something for fair weather only or is it for foul weather too? Is it for all weathers?



In our heart of hearts, we know that being brought into relationship with God through Jesus Christ and being filled with his Spirit is incomparable. In the broken world in which we live it is choosing life - life for now, for today and life for the future, and life for eternity.

In the Old Testament on the edge of the desert shortly before the people were to cross the Jordan and enter the Promised Land led by Joshua -

Moses says to them: "I set before you, life and prosperity, death and destruction..." "Now choose life so that you and your children may live."

In every generation, we have to make that choice and the consequences are huge for us and our children and grandchildren and great grandchildren.

I look forward to seeing you at St Andrew's or in the village. Do get in touch if you would like a visit at home.
