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

MOLE VALLEY DISTRICT COUNCIL'S JOINT ENFORCEMENT TEAM

Having been in operation for a little over nine months, the Joint Enforcement Team has quickly established itself as an invaluable resource in Mole Valley District Council's efforts to address anti-social behaviour and low-level crime quickly and effectively.

The Joint Enforcement Team (JET), working in partnership with the Police, has investigated close to 750 reports of anti-social behaviour (ASB) since April 2019. The level of awareness about how and where to report anti-social behaviour to Mole Valley District Council (MVDC) has increased since the team's introduction, leading to responding to more reports than ever before.

The JET's three enforcement officers have responded to a wide range of ASB cases since April, of which 93% have been relating to instances of abandoned vehicles, fly-tips and community ASB. The nature of the JET's role often means having to travel to locations across the district. Reflecting MVDC's commitment to reducing its carbon footprint, the team have been using two new 100% electric vehicles to conduct patrols and attend sites where ASB has been reported.

In an effort to further address and put measures in place to prevent ASB, MVDC will soon be introducing 15 cameras at identified fly-tip hotspots to deter individuals from illegally dumping waste and potentially capture footage of perpetrators who choose to do so regardless.

ActionFraud TV Licence scam

National Fraud & Cyber Crime Reporting Centre

WW 0300 123 2040 WW These emails are a phishing scam, a common type of email fraud where scammers will send bogus emails pretending to be from a respectable organisation. This is to trick you into clicking through to a fake website where you will enter your personal details.

For this scam, the emails are disguised to look like they have been sent by the TV Licensing organisation. They may say you're entitled to a refund for an overpayment or warn that your licence is about to expire. They will then ask you to respond by entering your bank details on a fake website.

Although the emails may use the TV Licensing logo and have other features that make them look authentic, **you should never trust them**.

What should I do if I get this email?

If you see this suspicious email, don't reply with your details or open any links or documents. Delete it straight away.

You can report the phishing attempt to Action Fraud (0300 123 2040). Not all reports will be investigated, but every report will help Action Fraud better understand the scale of a problem and the methods that scammers are using.

Box Hill Resident's Scam Experience

One day last month, a retired Box Hill resident received a phone call from someone who said they were from BT and there was a problem with the internet connection which needed fixing. The gentleman who received this call is a regular computer user and not someone likely to be duped by a fake call. He had received similar calls before but, on those occasions, something had told him it was scam, so he had terminated the call.

But this call didn't prompt the same sense of caution and he spent almost two hours talking to two "foreign sounding" men who eventually convinced him to log into his computer and make a payment – or at least try to. Fortunately, something stopped the payment going through, and when this happened, the caller – the scammer – boldly told our Box Hill resident that the call was a scam and put the phone down.

On contacting his bank, our resident was relieved to learn that no financial loss had been incurred but he was put to the inconvenience of having to stop his bank cards and change all his bank accounts to eliminate the risk of any further efforts by the scammers to defraud him.

So, if you receive such a call, be cautious. If an unknown caller wants you to log into your computer, <u>don't</u>. <u>Never</u> give your bank details to a cold caller.

Just meet the van at its drop off times and take whatever food you would like. There is normally surplus bread, rolls, vegetables, fruit and often drinks and frozen food. Take as much as you want, but just don't waste it. If you can make a contribution that's great but this is not essential.

Where does the food come from?

The food is surplus, mainly from supermarkets, but also from individuals, wholesalers, manufacturers and other ad hoc suppliers such as airlines. We'll have your chutney whether it is home-made or from the shop, we don't mind. So long as it is edible and packaged food is labelled. All the supermarket and wholesaler foods are **in date**. There are many reasons why businesses give us surplus food. Often it is because the food is unsold at the end of the day, but also it may be an end of line or end of promotion item.

As I'm preparing this contribution right at the beginning of January, may I start by wishing everybody all success in 2020!!

If the theme of my previous report was Highways, this edition I want to concentrate on a couple of critical consultations that

are taking place. I know that many of you have strong views on these issues, so it's really important you take your chance to have your views heard.

CONSULTATION: PRUDENTIAL RIDELONDON CYCLE EVENT

The first is a consultation about the future of the Prudential RideLondon cycling event and whether it should continue to be routed through Surrey.

- Residents will recall that this event was agreed by the then Surrey County Council Leader and Boris Johnson (as mayor of London) in 2012 without any local consultation.
- Since then I, Malcolm Ladell and Hazel Watson have done our best each year to communicate with the organisers to manage the event's impact locally.
- The current consultation is as to whether the event should continue for 5 more years from 2021 to 2025. You must submit your views before the consultation period closes on 16th February.

CONSULTATION: MOLE VALLEY DRAFT LOCAL PLAN

As I advised two months ago, the new Draft Local Plan for Mole Valley is coming for public consultation from 3rd February till 16th March. The Plan itself is available online at futuremolevalley.org where you can also see the list of 13 exhibition events around the District. Probably the most convenient for Box Hill residents are:

- Saturday 15th Feb 1pm-5:30pm Dorking Christian Centre
- Monday 2nd March 9:30am-1:30pm Pippbrook, Dorking
- Friday 6th March 4:30pm-8:30pm Dorking Christian Centre

The draft plan sets out a scheme, devised over the last three years, which could deliver the Government-imposed housing targets for Mole Valley for the next 15 years; it also proposes various changes to local planning policies, including many addressing the challenges of countering climate change. The housing target can only be achieved by designating some sites in the Green Belt for housing. If you have strong feelings about whether this is the best approach for our community, please take some time to look at the proposals and respond to the consultation.

EPSOM & ST HELIER HOSPITALS CONSULTATION

There is also a consultation event around the proposals for Epsom & St Helier hospitals. The most convenient "listening event" is at Epsom Downs Racecourse on Tuesday 11th February from 6:30pm-8:30pm. The questionnaire is on-line at www.improvinghealthcaretogether.org or you can ring 02038 800 271 in working hours.

HEADLEY ROADWORKS - WATER MAIN REPLACEMENT

Meanwhile the water main replacement work in Headley means the closure of Church Lane for several months. At present you can still reach St Mary's Church, the Cock Inn, Headley Village Stores and Tearooms, and Headley Village Hall from the South (i.e. via Headley Common Road) without needing a diversion. There is no published schedule for when the closure of Headley Common Road will take place – but it is clear that this will be very disruptive for many Box Hill residents and especially those dependent on the bus service.

OTHER MATTERS

I am also aware of various road flooding issues following the very heavy rain pre-Christmas and am discussing these with Surrey Highways to the extent that blocked drainage systems contributed to the problems.

Finally, we are still awaiting a planning application for the development at Headley Court.

Since Rob Moon wrote the above, MVDC has announced the following campaign which may help, but there is still a lot of rubbish not being cleared by the Council.



On 4 February 2020, Mole Valley District Council's (MVDC) Cabinet will consider a report recommending a publicity campaign aimed at discouraging drivers from

dropping litter onto road verges.

The 'Only Losers Litter' campaign would warn litterers that they could face a fine of up to £100 if they are caught in the act. In a play on the word 'loser', publicity would feature a driver throwing £10 notes out of their car as they would litter.

Signs would be placed on roads in the district, and the campaign's messages will be publicised on digital channels including MVDC's social media platforms and website. MVDC would also seek coverage in the local media and run an advertising campaign on local radio.

The facility to report littering online at http://www.molevalley.gov.uk/JET will be heavily publicised.

Councillor Claire Malcomson, Cabinet Member for the Environment, said: "Our message is clear: we don't tolerate this anti-social behaviour, and those caught will be fined. Littering on road verges is a blight on Mole Valley's natural environment, and empty cans and bottles can trap small mammals and kill them. We hope that the idea of losing money will deter people from becoming a loser that litters."

The campaign would run in March.

DOG GROOMING DAYS

A huge thank you for the cards and gifts we received over the Christmas period. I personally appreciate greatly that my customers take the time and the trouble over a busy and

what can be stressful time to think of their dog groomer. Again, thank you so much.

Well, after a very hectic and extremely busy three weeks before Christmas, both my assistant and I enjoyed our two-week rest. I had one "no show" even though we rang everyone the day before to remind them of their December appointment. Some of my colleagues around the country were quite stressed out by the number of "no shows" they had. I say again, this is our livelihood, please respect it.

February is usually the quietest time of my dog grooming year but at this time of year there's still an average two week wait for an appointment – depending on the weather. However, if we do get a cancellation, we may be able to get your dog in at short notice so please call if you want a quick appointment - you never know.

Now, a catch up on other dog related matters. Anderson Moore Veterinary Specialists - the forerunners looking into the cause of Alabama Rot - have said that since 2012, there have been over 200 cases of this disease. In 2019 there were 25 confirmed cases, significantly less than the 46 case in 2018, but for pet owners who lost a pet last year, 25 cases are too many. Sadly, there is still no known cause, other than most contaminated pets appear to come down with this in very wet or very damp weather. Keep vigilant and get to your vet immediately if your pet has any skin problems.

Veterinary professionals in the UK recorded their first case of Leishmaniosis in 2019, thought to have been passed on by another dog to a Shih Tzu, rather by travel to an area where the infection is endemic. Leishmaniosis is carried by the female sand fly and transmitted by its bite.

I KNOW it's only February, but if you go on holiday during any half term or the summer and you need to board your pet/s, remember that the good kennels/sitters/home boarders with a good reputation will get booked up early, so please do not leave it to the last minute and book into any place that can take your pet. If you really care about your pets, you will take the time, trouble and check these places out BEFORE you book. I always advise a short trial, before you go away on a longer break, to make sure your pet settles and you are please when you collect your pet that all is well and that they have been looked after properly. Yes, I know it will cost you a bit more by doing this, but is your pets are ok while you are off enjoying yourself. In fact, a number of my customers tend to book their pets somewhere first, making sure they are ok, before they book their own holiday.

DOG GROOMING DAYS (Continuation)

Remember, home boarders and pet sitters need to be insured and if staying in your home, police checked. This is of course if they are running a business. If you ask a friend to look after your pets and no money is changing hands, then it is not necessary, BUT if the person looking after your pet/s has a problem caused by your pet/s then you, the pet owner, will be liable. Also, if your pet is on medication, always make sure you leave more than required, just in case your return is delayed

I have mentioned feeding wildlife before, especially foxes and the damage it can cause other animals. I need to mention it again because two of my customers' dogs have suffered epileptic fits due to eating food that had gone off, one a standard poodle and the other a cockerpoo. The food was left on the heath by people who thought it would be good for the foxes, not realising other animals eat it as well. Both of these dogs could have died, so while some people are hoping to help feed the foxes and thinking they are doing something good for the wildlife, just remember you may kill someone's much loved pet as a result.

Plea from a dog owner

I just wanted to bring to people's attention the dangers of putting food out for wild animals and/or discarding any unwanted food in the woods and up on the heath. This seems to be happening much more frequently. By all means, feed the foxes, birds, badgers etc in your own garden but by putting it in public places means that our dogs will usually smell it out and eat it long before the foxes find it. We leave food either accidentally through our carelessness with rubbish, or deliberately because we think we are helping them, the wild animals. However, we are NOT acting in these animals' best interests at all. Mouldy food will not be good for any animal.

My dog was recently extremely ill (and nearly died by having a massive seizure) as a result of eating inappropriate food left out. On occasions the food has been carelessly thrown or left after a picnic, other times it seems that it has been deliberately left in a pile for animals to find - on one occasion, it looked like a whole bag of dog kibble had been emptied at the side of the path leading to High Ashurst. This is so dangerous as so many foods are toxic to dogs and if the food goes bad or mouldy, this too can be fatal.

I do beg you please to think about what you are doing when you put food down. Although it's hard to waste food and we think we are doing good, we are actually making our animals very ill and could their death. Thank you.

The new polymer £20 note is coming on 20 February 2020. It features the artist JMW Turner.



Key security features

Focus on these two key security features to help confirm that your notes are genuine:

- 1. Hologram image change: Tilt the note from side to side. Check the words change between 'Twenty' and 'Pounds'.
- 2. See-through windows: Look at the metallic image over the main window. Check the foil is blue and gold on the front of the note and silver on the back. Look for a second, smaller window in the bottom corner of the note.

Other security features

The Queen's portrait in the see-through window: A portrait of the Queen is printed on the window with '£20 Bank of England' printed twice around the edge.

Silver foil patch: A silver foil patch contains a 3D image of the coronation crown. You will find this above the see-through window on the front of the note.

Purple foil patch: A round, purple foil patch contains the letter 'T'. You will find this on the back of the note, directly behind the silver crown on the front of the note.

Feel of polymer and raised print: The printed lines and colours on the note are sharp, clear and free from smudges or blurred edges. If you use a magnifying glass, you will see the value of the note written in small letters and numbers below the Queen's portrait.

Ultra-violet number: Under a good quality ultra-violet light, the number '20' appears in bright red and green on the front of the note, against a duller background.

The New Polymer £20 Note (Continuation)

Design features

Tactile feature: On the front of the note (the side with raised print), there are three clusters of raised dots in the top left-hand corner. This tactile feature helps blind and partially sighted people identify the value of the note.

Size: The higher the value of a note, the larger it is. This note is approximately 139mm x 73mm.



Unique numbering: A unique serial number is printed horizontally and vertically on the back of the note. The horizontal number is in the bottom right corner. It is made up of multicoloured letters and numbers, which increase in height from left to right. The vertical number runs down the left-hand side and the numbers and letters are the same height and colour.

Copyright symbols: The international copyright symbol is on the front and back of the note, below the 'Twenty Pounds' text.

Historical character: JMW Turner's self-portrait was painted circa 1799 and is currently on display at Tate Britain.

Artwork: "The Fighting Temeraire" (above) is one of Turner's most famous paintings. This was a tribute to the ship HMS Temeraire, which played a distinguished role in Nelson's victory at the Battle of Trafalgar in 1805.

Quote: 'Light is therefore colour' is a quote from a lecture Turner gave in 1818 and a reference to his innovative use of light, shade, colour and tone.

Signature: Turner's signature is from his Will, in which he left many of his paintings to the nation.

Using old £20 notes

You will still be able to use the paper ± 20 note until we withdraw it from circulation. We will announce the withdrawal date after we have issued our new polymer ± 20 note. We will give six months' notice of this withdrawal date.

Cookies.....without the cream

A couple of years ago, a governing body of the internet decided it needed to standardise on certain processes and be more open about what the website providers were collating. As a result. most companies on the internet were encouraged to use a code of practice about what data they collect when you log on to their website. This is done through the use of cookies.

What is a Cookie?

A cookie is a small file, often encrypted, which allows a website to recognise a user's device. It is typically made up of letters and numbers and is downloaded on to your device when you access a website.

Cookies are generally used to help users navigate websites more efficiently and perform certain functions. Since their core role is to enhance usability and improve processes, if you disable cookies you may find that the website does not perform as well as you would expect.

When you load a particular website, a cookie is created. Every time you then revisit that specific website, the browser retrieves and sends this file to the website's server. Computer Cookies are also being created by other websites when ads, plug-ins, widgets, or other elements on the page are being loaded. These cookies regulate how the ads appear or how the widgets and other elements function on the page.

Types of cookies

Some Cookies will expire at the end of a browser session, while other are stored for longer. Types of cookies include:

• Session cookies – these cookies are the ones which allow websites to track the various actions of a user during a browser session. They have a variety of purposes. For example, a session cookie would be working when the website you are visiting remembers what you have put in your shopping basket. Session cookies generally expire after a browser session ends.

• **Persistent cookies** – these cookies are stored on your device between browser sessions. This is useful because it enables the preferences/actions of the user to be remembered across a website. Persistent cookies are also used for a variety of purposes; however, they are most famous for being used by a website to perform target advertising.

Types of Cookies (Continuation)

• First and third-party cookies – first party cookies are the cookies which are set by a specific website visited by the user. Third party cookies are set by a domain which is not the one being visited by the user. For example, if you visit a website and a separate company has set a cookie through that website this would be a third-party cookie.

• Tracking Cookies are a specific type of cookie that is distributed, shared, and read across two or more unrelated Web sites for the purpose of gathering information or potentially to present customized data to you. ... Tracking cookies are not harmful like malware, worms, or viruses, but they can be a privacy concern. With aggressive tracking cookies, these companies can know your location, device information, purchase history, search queries, and so much more. Sometimes, you never even know this information is being collected. However, some countries, like the UK, have adopted laws that require websites to notify users about their data being collected through cookies.

Are these cookies secure?

Cookies are not computer viruses, they cannot be executed nor are they selfexecuting, they also cannot replicate and spread to other networks to execute. Since they cannot perform these functions, they fall outside the standard definition of a virus.

Because cookies store information about a user's browsing preferences and history, they can sometimes be used to act as a form of spyware. Many anti-spyware products recognize this and will flag-up certain cookies for deletion, following a scan.

Puglia has a rich history and over the years has played host to the Greeks, Romans, Byzantines, Normans, Spanish and now the location for the latest James Bond Movie. Weather: Our seasons



There are four seasons in the year in the UK, but what causes them and how do they affect us?

What causes the seasons?

The Earth is like a slightly squished ball that orbits around the Sun, taking one year to make a complete orbit. Imagine a rod sticking through the Earth going from the North Pole to the South Pole. This is its axis. Each day, the Earth spins around on its axis once - this is what gives us night and day.

But the Earth doesn't spin upright, its axis is tilted, like it has fallen over a little on one side. This tilt of 23.5 degrees is what causes our seasons. As we pass round the sun, some parts of the Earth are tilted towards the Sun and they get more of its heat, while others are tilted away, and get less of the Sun's heat. This is not because they are nearer to or further away from the Sun, but because the heat from the Sun arrives in waves, which can travel through the atmosphere more directly in the areas titled towards the Sun.

Because of this the UK has four seasons:

- **Summer**, when the northern hemisphere, where the UK is, is tilted towards the Sun
- Autumn, as the northern hemisphere begins to tilt away from the Sun
- Winter, when the northern hemisphere is fully tilted away from the Sun
- Spring, when the northern hemisphere begins to tilt back towards the Sun again.

What is the solstice?

There are in fact two solstices - the summer solstice and the winter solstice.

The summer solstice occurs when the northern hemisphere is fully tilted towards the Sun. This occurs on the 21 or 22 June each year and gives us our longest day and shortest night.

The winter solstice occurs when the northern hemisphere is fully tilted away from the Sun. This occurs on the 21 or 22 December each year and gives us our shortest day and longest night.

What is the equinox?

There are two equinox and they occur half-way between the two solstices, marking the start of spring and autumn and is when the northern hemisphere is not tilted towards or away from the Sun.


Technically the equinox marks an astronomical change in season, which is slightly different to the meteorological seasons described, mostly above due to the latitude of the UK.

Do other countries have the same seasons?

Yes and no; the seasons are caused by the Earth's tilt, but the depending on where you are on the Earth will depend on how much the tilt affects the weather. So most countries at a similar latitude (the same distance away from the equator) to the UK will generally have the same four seasons, but other parts of the world may only have two seasons - a winter and a summer, or a wet and a dry season. Some places only have one season as there is little change to their weather throughout the year.

Things that affect the seasons: El Niño and La Niña

The tropical Pacific Ocean has a warming and cooling cycle. This cycle is a completely natural event and usually lasts between three to seven years.



When the waters become warmer it is called El Niño, and when they become cooler it is called La Niña. During the cycle, the temperature of the ocean can change by around 3 °C between the warmest and coolest times.

People who fish off the South American coast have known about this natural event for hundreds of years. With an El Niño, they see a huge fall in the numbers of fish caught. In the UK during a La Niña year, the weather may milder, wetter and windier than normal, but this is not always true. Scientists are only just beginning to understand how the event affects Earth's weather and climate, though they do know that it causes the circulation of air to move from their normal patterns, which will cause expected weather to change during El Niño or La Niña years, and that the stronger the change in the temperatures the bigger the changes in the weather.

As we come into a new decade, the team at Dorking Museum would like to thank visitors, supporters, volunteers and members for contributing to an eventful and exceptional year in 2019 and look forward to another exciting year in 2020. Are you making the most of this valuable local resource that celebrates the rich heritage of the town and surrounding villages?

In 2019, around 3,500 visitors were welcomed to the Museum, but that is only part of the story. The team also took 1,100 people underground on tours of the South Street Caves and 500 people on its programme of guided walks in Dorking town, on the Deepdene Trail and at Betchworth Castle. Its youth activities benefitted over 130 children and adults on school and youth group visits and welcomed 350 participants to its school holiday and half term family activities. Museum Gallery Talks and book launches attracted around 200 visitors and a similar number attended the team's talks and presentations at other venues, as well as many who saw the Museum's exhibitions 'on the road' at Dorking Halls and Brooklands Museum. In addition, there were also archive visits, oral history interviews and much more besides.

The Museum mounted three new exhibitions during the year and held two community events for Remembrance. The South Street Caves were used for filming for a BBC/PBS television series while the Museum was nominated for the Women's History Network Community History Prize for the short film 'Suffragettes in the Surrey Hills', hosted a joint community First World War digitisation event in conjunction with Oxford University's 'Lest We Forget' project and provided the Dorking content for the national Mayflower 400 website and self-guided walking app. The Museum's publishing arm, The Cockerel Press, had a bumper year, producing and publishing six new books on a range of local themes.

With online coverage taking museums to a wider national and international audience, the Museum welcomed 44,000 visitors to its website and amassed 1,100 followers on Facebook, 2,500 on Twitter and 600 on Instagram.

Museum Chairman Nigel Arch sums up the year: "Every year our reach gets wider, and more people within our community are able to benefit from our services and facilities. Dorking Museum is a real jewel in the crown for both the town and district. We reach far and wide, our activities not confined by the Museum's walls, celebrating our shared heritage."



Letter from the Rector

Anno Domini 2020 is a year that I am sure many advertisers, authors and even preachers have been looking forward to! All keen to get our attention with strap lines about seeing clearly and having 20/20 vision!

I found these words of definition that: "20/20 vision is a measurement of a person's 'visual acuity' 20 feet away

from a test chart (which is American terminology). Simply put, visual acuity measures how well you can see using the letter chart that your optician likely uses to test your eyes. Although society associates having 20/20 as perfect vision, it's possible to have even better visual acuity. However, more suitable terminology is 'normal vision'

rather than perfect. Also, in the UK, 6/6 is the equivalent of 20/20 vision."

I well remember how at my prep school, aged about eleven, I began to find it rather hard to see the blackboard – or as some might say the chalkboard. After this had persisted for some time it must have been commented on as my



twin brother and I then both found ourselves in the opticians in Reigate and being diagnosed as a little short sighted and in need of spectacles. We were a little worried about being called "four eyes" so made up a little song (rather like Christopher Robin) called "Four eyes are better than two eyes." Sadly, I only remember its title!

Sight is a very important and a very personal thing, by it we learn so much about the world and ourselves, without it the world is plunged into darkness. Those who lose it, or have never had it, often develop their other senses more. But it also serves as a good metaphor as in sometimes we fail to 'see' accurately. George Benson sang these words about 20/20 vision: "If I knew back then what I know now, if I understood the what, when, why and how. Now it's clear to me what I should have done, but hindsight is 20/20 vision."

Those of us with teenage children or grandchildren are probably very familiar with the experience of how their 'view' of the world and 'perception' of themselves or others changes quite strongly. It can be a tricky time and we have to remember we all went through some version of it. Mark Twain famously said of his Dad: "When I was a boy of 14, my father was so ignorant I could hardly stand to have the old man around. But when I got to be 21, I was astonished at how much he had learned in seven years."

He wrote amusingly about the way a teenage perspective changes and develops – but what if our view of God is something that needs to change in a similar way? It may take us seven years, it may take longer, for change is often slow even when we see the need for it. I am still changing.
